'Accomplice' of Pantages Hunted

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 21.—(U.P.)—Search for an accomplice, said to have assisted Alexander Pantages, theater magnate, after the showman's asserted attack on Eunice Pringle, 17-year-old dancer, was sought today by the district attorney's office.

According to Robert Stewart, chief deputy district attorney, investigators are positive a man in a blue suit rushed to the mezzanine room following Miss Pringle's screams.

Stewart said he had information that the man made every effort to prevent Miss Pringle from escaping and that he lifted Pantages from the floor and helped him adjust his clothing.

Finally, Stewart declared, the man rushed Pantages up a short flight of steps to the theater man's private office.

Stewart said it was believed at first that the mysterious man was Roy Keen, assistant manager of the Pantages theater, or one of two publicity men.

The deputy district attorney said that questioning of the three employees had convinced the prosecution that another man helped to "cover up" for Pantages.

Earle 'Buck' Harris, Former Lightweight Champion of Southern States, In Charge of Bouts; Some Great Fighters Slated to Appear in Season's Opener Saturday Night.

Colvin Makes Good on Amount Forged Checks

Disabled Veteran Adjudged Not Mentally Responsible and Released, Says He Will Get Job With Former Employers.

Three forged checks were made good and W.H. Colvin released from custody here yesterday noon because of the fact that he is suffering mentally as the result of shell shock and other disability sustained during the war. He is going back to the middle west, and expects to return to the employ of Sears, Roebuck and Company, where he was formerly employed, he stated yesterday just before his departure by stage.

He is being sent to Kansas City, where at one time he was a ward in the government hospital, having been committed four times to various hospitals, according to records received here by Dr. F. M. Ferguson, local representative of the veterans' bureau.

Dr. Ferguson testified yesterday morning at Colvin's preliminary hearing that the man is likely to be mentally irresponsible at times, and inasmuch as it was brought out in the hearing that money for the making good of the checks had been sent, and that Colvin was mentally not to be held responsible, Judge Roger Foley dismissed the case upon motion of District Attorney Harley A. Harmon, thus not only preventing the prosecution of a broken man who is a victim of the ravages of the world war, but also saving Clark county the additional expense of conducting a trial against him.

Colvin waived his preliminary hearing, but due to his poor physical condition and nervousness, evidence as to his mental fitness was taken and the release was ordered. He has been drawing disabled veteran's compensation since 1924, having been committed in 1924, 1925, 1926 and 1929 to hospitals.

Colvin was making an effort when he came to Las Vegas to repay money he took in similar manner from Sears, Roebuck and Co., which case was not prosecuted by that firm for reasons similar to the present dismissal.

The Union Cafe was refunded \$50, the A. G. Kitchen \$65 and the Northern Club \$80 yesterday, in settlement for the money these firms had lost. Colvin had sent this money to Las Vegas soon after he left, and before he was caught in Chicago.

Colvin is the man whose arrest in Chicago and subsequent return to Las Vegas in custody of the sheriff cost Clark county several hundred dollars.

Under the direction of Earle "Buck" Harris, former amateur lightweight champion of the Southern States and later prominent in boxing affairs throughout the South, the local American Legion will inaugurate a two show a month schedule on Saturday night, August 31.

Matchmaker Harris promises to show the highest class talent commensurate with the turnout of the local fans. While the opening card will not be announced until Monday, Harris has lined up for future bouts such widely known boxers as Jock Malone, the St. Paul flash, who has fought Mickey Walker four times, getting one decision, and who two months ago administered a fancy trimming to Rene de Vos, the Belgian flash.

Everett Strong, Delos "Kid" Williams, Dick Hoppe and others are also lined up for the card, which, it is promised, will put Legion boxing cards here on a new basis entirely.

Harris is an old timer in the boxing game and if fans will show by their patronage that Las Vegas will support high class boxing the leading lights of biffology will be imported.

Boxing has proved popular in the past in Las Vegas, due to the splendid cards staged by the Legion boys, and now that the hot weather is about ready to take a back seat and allow the crowd to come back to town there is no doubt in the minds of those in a position to know but that it is on the verge of even greater popularity than ever before.

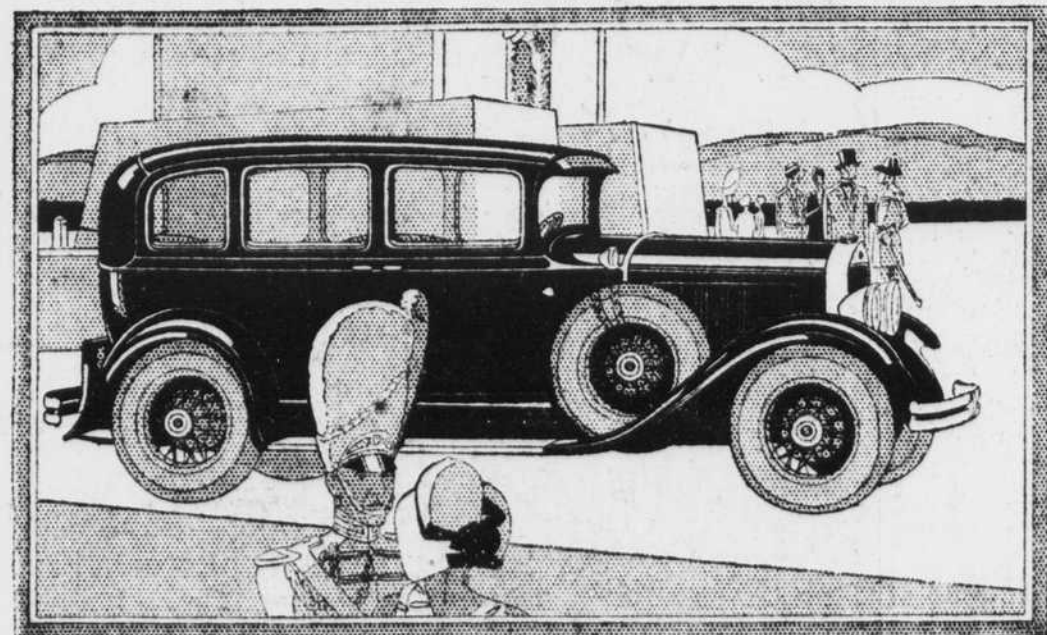

Brewery, 36 Cases, Night in Jail, \$100

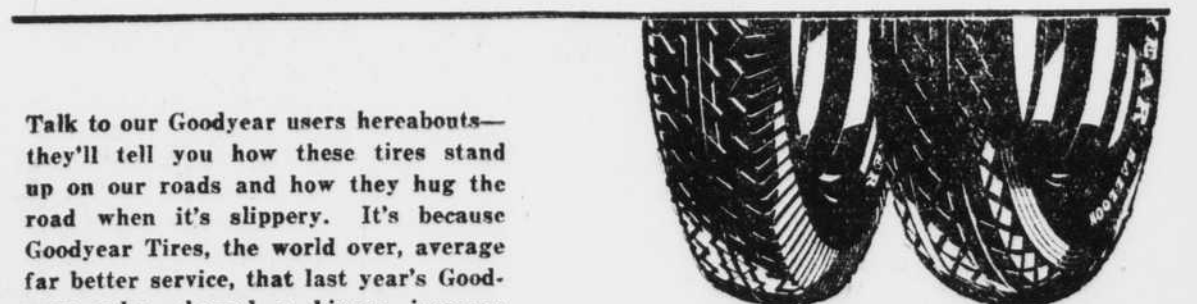
Possession of 36 cases of beer in an alleged "brewery" on the West Side Tuesday night cost W. Haddow a night in jail and a hundred dollar fine.
