### Cedar City Rodeo Three Day Event

The many details of the American Legion Rodeo which will be held at Cedar City, Utah, Thursday, Friday and Saturday, August 29, 30 and 31, are practically complete. G. R. Parry, chairman of the general committee reports that according to present information at hand this will be the biggest and most interesting show the Legion Boys have ever presented.

The horse racing will be the main feature of the show. A present reservation for stalls have been made from Delta, Panguitch, Richfield, Pleasant Grove and Parowan, to say nothing of the many horses that Cedar City horsemen will enter. The track is in excellent shape and by the race dates will be in "the pink of condition."

The prizes offered in the Rodeo competition compare favorably with many of the larger shows. Interest is keen this year in the bucking horse contest. Several of the local boys are out for the big money this year and vow that they can ride anything that can get in the corral.

"Podunk" the Rodeo Clown, who was here in 1922 and 1923 will again be in the show with a new line of laugh-makers.

The wrestling and fight card is going to be one of the main features of the evening entertainment. Ira Dern, Utah's Airplane Specialist, together with Herbert Milne, the local committeeman in charge of fights will conduct the card. They are presenting such talent as Sailor Jack Lewis, Papino, O'Shocker, Hy Sharman, Jimmie Long, and DeLaun Heaton. The first two nights will be matched bouts, while on the last night an "all star" card will be presented in which the winners of the first two nights will meet.

This is the Sixth annual Rodeo that the American Legion Boys of Cedar City has staged. They now have an organization that is hard to equal. The proceeds of the Rodeo and Race meet are being placed in a sinking fund for which someday they hope to build themselves a comfortable club house.

Stocking of the Eagle and Spring valleys with 8,000 fish from government hatcheries in Utah is a prospect likely of fulfillment, according to J. C. Wittwer, extension agent here.

Senator Oddie is using his influence to secure assurance of this, it is believed.

Furthermore, assurance was given early this week that a survey of the streams in Spring Valley will be made by the government with the view to possible establishment of a federal hatchery in this valley.

This assurance was given James N. Hollinger, of Spring valley, president of the Lincoln county farm bureau, and Samuel A. Hollinger, of Urcine, during a visit at the State and Federal fish hatcheries at Springville, Utah.

These two men also visited the Ford hatchery at Richfield, Utah.

The two streams in question run through Lincoln county.

### HOLLYWOOD'S FILM SHOP

HOLLYWOOD, Aug. 21. (U.P.)—The motion picture has given rise to one of the country's most peculiar enterprises—a lion farm.

Founded on film funds, fed by necessity and thriving on publicity resulting from film tie-ups, Gay's lion farm has reached the point where it is one of Southern California's show places.

Some 8 years ago, Charles Gay, a Frenchman, arrived on the outskirts of Hollywood with his wife and three circus lions.

One of the beasts was "Numa," now a 15-year-old creature, who more than hundreds of thousands of motion picture fans the world over.

Numa, in the last eight years has made \$70,000 for Gay, an average of \$10,000 a year considering the fact that Numa was out of circulation one year with an injured vertebral.

Funds earned by Numa were responsible for the start of the farm. His income supplied its needs as it grew. Now Gay has 200 lions or his arm, self-supported through sales and through daily exhibitions to visitors, and still Numa brings in revenue.

True, Gay now has other lions which appear before the camera, but Numa's greater experience gives him first call and he always is selected to head the group when more than one of the beasts is necessary.

Gay's farm now is valued at \$300,000. The Frenchman expects in another year to be supplying the circus and zoo demands of the entire country. Numa still will be in pictures.

To date Numa has played with practically all the film stars in Hollywood.

His more important roles with Charlie Chaplin in "The Circus," with Gloria Swanson in "Male and Female," with Vilma Banky in "The Magic Flame," and with Charlie Murray in "Vamping Venus."

He also has played with Douglas McLean, Bebe Daniels and a score of others.
