ATTORNEYS ASK For U. S. Court Bar Association Petitions Senators and Congressman And Give Reasons Therefor.

At the last meeting of the Las Vegas Bar Association the necessity for the establishment of a federal court in Las Vegas was the chief subject of discussion. A committee consisting of T. A. Wells, president of the Bar Association, and chairman of the committee; I. S. Thompson and Roger Foley, appointed for the purpose prepared the following letter to Senators Oddie and Pittman and Congressman Arant:

Dear Senators and Congressman—

At a meeting of the Las Vegas Bar Association, held August 23, 1929, the establishing of a Federal Court at Las Vegas was enthusiastically discussed and resulted in the undersigned being appointed on a committee to take the matter up with you, that you might secure such a court for the southern part of Nevada.

In support of establishing a U. S. Court for the southern part of Nevada, we desire to present the following subjects over which the Federal Court has jurisdiction:

1. In all cases involving offenses against the laws of the U. S., especially the 18th amendment to the constitution and the Volstead Act, the defendants must all go or be taken at the expense of the Government to Carson City, Nevada, to plead, and returned again for trial. They must be tried in Carson City, before a jury selected from people who live in and about Carson City and Reno, and about 500 miles from the defendants' homes. We maintain that the right to be tried by a jury selected from people who live in the defendant's neighborhood is inviolate.
2. It is safe to say that more than 500 corporations have been formed in Las Vegas, under the laws of the state of Nevada, by citizens of California, mostly from Los Angeles or the southern part, who are doing business in California, but maintain their principal office in this city. These corporations often have occasion to use the Federal Courts, and they should be able to reach such court in Las Vegas, and not in Carson City. In California there is such a court in Los Angeles for the convenience of the people of the southern part of the State.
3. Controversies to which the U. S. shall be party.
4. Controversies between two or more states.
5. Controversies between a state and a citizen of another state.
6. Controversies between citizens of different states.
7. Controversies between citizens of the same state claiming land under grant of different states.
8. Controversies between a state and the citizens thereof and foreign states, citizens or subjects.

If the Volstead Act is to be enforced and the Boulder Dam constructed, there will be a great amount of litigation under each one of the above heads; all of which will arise in or near Las Vegas, Nevada. All the criminal cases and many of the civil cases will demand a jury, and in each instance the parties will be entitled to a jury empaneled from the southern end of the state. The Government, as well as the citizen who happens to be a litigant will be entitled to a trial at Las Vegas, where the litigants and the witnesses reside.

We earnestly request that a Federal Court be required to sit and hold court in Las Vegas, and that in all jury cases that such jury be selected from residents of the southern part of the state. And in case sitting of such court cannot be secured, then that the state of Nevada be divided into two districts, one for the northern end and one for the southern end of the state, and that a federal judge be appointed for the southern district, who shall make his home in Las Vegas.

That in the plans and specifications of any new Federal Building to be erected in Las Vegas, such court and its necessary adjuncts be provided for and included.
