mander of the ship, veered sharply to the northwest and went directly from Fairfax, Okla., to Iola, Kans. Storms and winds had delayed the Graf's progress in Texas during the night but the lost time was being made up rapidly as the ship roared across Kansas, where strong tail winds were enhancing its speed.

Clear skies favored the flight across the midwest and indicated that the Graf would easily reach Lakehurst, N. J., in time to lower the round-the-world speed record of 23 days set by John Mears and the late C. D. D. Collyer.

Scores of wealthy persons, not satisfied to get their glimpse of the famous commander and the ship from the ground, boarded airplanes to wave their welcome to the Germans. The planes circled around in the air at safe distance from the craft on its way across the city.

Michigan boulevard along Grant Park was a surging mass of humanity and approximately 40,000 others found seats in the big outdoor stadium.

Aside from the reception given Doctor Eckener and the passengers on arrival from Tokyo at Los Angeles, today's greeting probably was the greatest they had received in their flight across the United States.

Mr. Hooper married her in Price, Utah, June 4, 1928, bringing her to their new home in Las Vegas June 6 of that year.

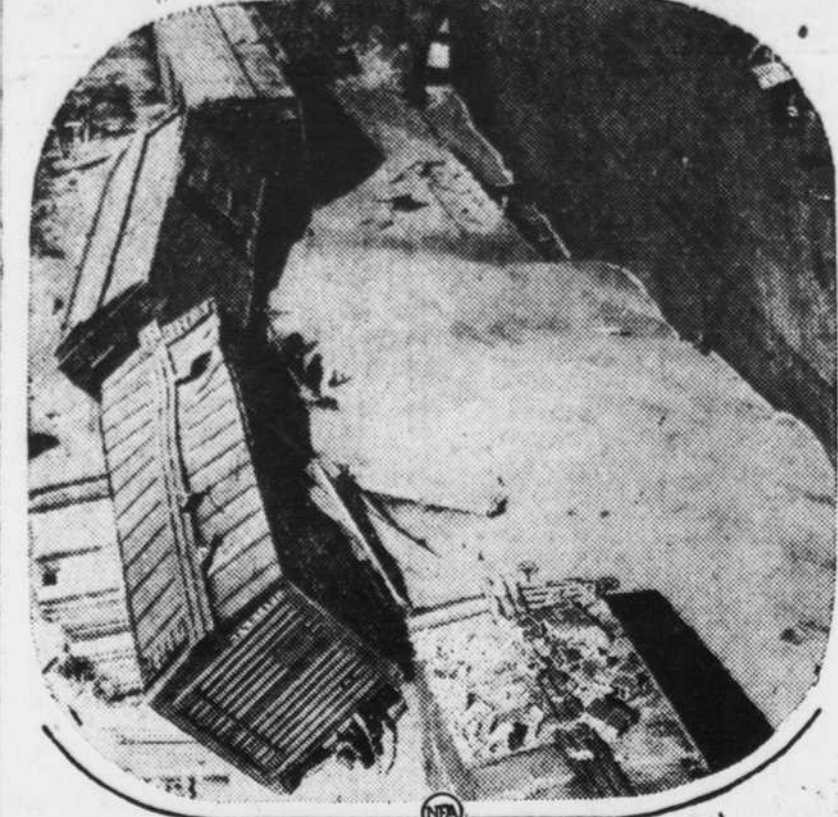
She had been ill for eleven months, the last four of which were spent in the hospital in Los Angeles.

Golden State's Diamond Jubilee

SACRAMENTO, Aug. 28—Five western states and the Republic of Mexico are joining with California in the celebration of the Golden State's Diamond Jubilee State Fair which opens in Sacramento, August 31 and continues for ten days.

One of the exposition buildings, magnificently decorated, will be given over to the displays of Oregon, Utah, Idaho, Wyoming and Nevada. In this building will also be the Mexico exhibit and central display from the California farm of President Herbert Hoover.

Another of the main buildings will house exhibits from 55 of California's 58 counties. It will be the greatest showing of California products and resources in the history of the state.

A premium list of \$125,000 is offered in the various departments of the Jubilee Fair, including \$27,000 for livestock, \$10,000 for agriculture and horticulture, \$23,000 for the horse show, \$34,000 for harness and running races and \$8,000 in the educational division.

An exceptionally attractive program of amusements and grandstand features is scheduled for the record crowds which are expected to attend.

Governor C. C. Young and executives of the California State Fair Board today expressed appreciation for the interest and co-operation extended by other western states in making the California Anniversary Fair and exposition representative of the whole Pacific Slope area.

The Board has authorized the giving of free admission tickets to motorists coming from other states to the exposition.
