70 DROWN AS STEAMER SINKS

(Continued From Page One) today by H. O. Bluenchen, captain of the tanker S. C. T. Dodd, in which he blamed officers of the steamer San Juan for the collision. However, almost simultaneously, libels for \$1,800,000, of which \$1,000,000 was for the officers, sailors and passengers of the San Juan and the remainder for the cargo, were filed against the Standard Oil company and the tanker. The demands for libel charged the Dodd with responsibility for the collision, because it was traveling at a high speed and for failing to sound a signal. By GEORGE D. (AP)—Declaring that "it seemed as though the hand of God saved us," 29 survivors of the steamer San Juan wreck arrived in San Francisco at 12:50 p. m., Pacific standard time. Tales of horror were related by the survivors of the sea disaster. The S. C. T. Dodd, an oil tanker,

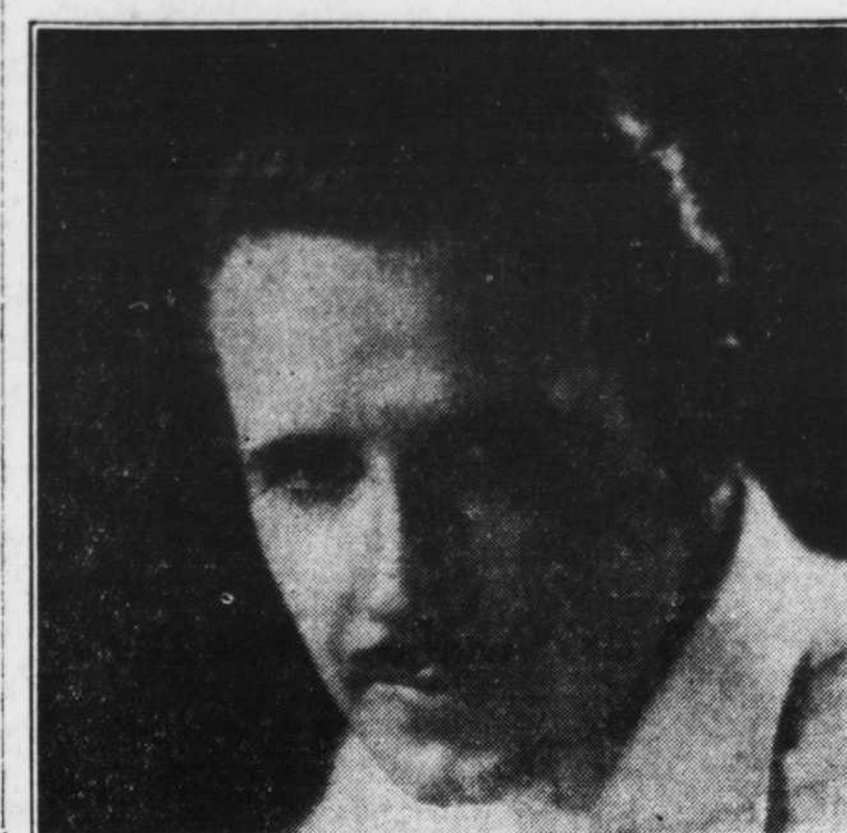
which collided with the San Juan at 11:59 last night, brought the survivors to this port. Several of those were rushed to the hospitals. As she pulled up to the dock the Dodd showed plainly that she had experienced trouble. The impact that crumpled the timbers of the old San Juan tore three holes in the starboard side of the tanker, but she was seaworthy yet. Some of the survivors who left San Francisco late Thursday, bound for Los Angeles on the regular run of the San Juan, were clad in night clothes. The crash came while they were asleep. Margie Dansby, 18-year-old San Francisco co-ed, told the United Press: "I was asleep in my stateroom when a shattering impact awakened me. The ship seemed to shudder violently and I was thrown from my berth. "A wave of green water swept in when I opened the stateroom door, and it threw me back in the berth. "Getting on deck I was swept overboard by the next wave. The water was rough and the fog was so thick I couldn't see. It seemed as though the hand of God saved me." Swimming rapidly away from the fast settling hulk, Miss Dansby was pulled aboard a life boat sent out by the Dodd. A frenzied mob swept down on the docks shortly after the Dodd came into port. Pitiful scenes were enacted as grayhaired women shouted the names of their sons, and as wives, sweethearts and friends scanned faces, and screamed names in the hope that their loved ones would be among the 29 survivors aboard the Dodd. The rush toward the gangplank was so determined that a guard line was thrown about the place. Most of the 29 were taken from the ship over its side and rushed away in automobiles and taxicabs. Tender scenes were enacted by those who succeeded in dodging the police barrier and made their way to the survivors. Great confusion and turmoil prevailed. "Oh granma, one tiny lad, wrapped in a man's overcoat, shouted to Mrs. A. Franks, San Francisco. "The ship sunk! It was lots of fun!" The boy was Hollis Piper, 6. His parents are among those who are listed as missing.

Miss Frazier Gives Details On Registration

Times, Places For Students First to Report Told By Principal, Enrollment On Tuesday, Classes Wednesday.

Information concerning registration times and places for students enrolling in the Las Vegas school system next week was made public yesterday by Maude Frazier, principal. All students will register Tuesday. Regular school work will start on Wednesday. Kindergarten children who have not attended kindergarten before will be enrolled at the Kindergartens at 9 a. m. Tuesday, September 3. West Side children should enroll at the West Side kindergarten. Only children who will be 5 years of age on or before December 31, 1929, will be admitted to kindergarten. Children who have attended Kindergarten one semester will enroll at their respective kindergartens at 1:15 on Tuesday, September 3. Elementary School All grade children except the 8A grade will enroll in their home rooms at 8:15 Tuesday, September 3. The grade will be posted on the door of the class room. Children of first, second, third and fourth grades who live on the West Side will enroll at the West Side school. High School Seniors and juniors will enroll at the high school building Tuesday, September 3 at 8:15. Sophomores, Freshmen and 8As will enroll at the high school building the same day at 1:15. All high school students and 8As will be required to make a textbook deposit of \$2.50 each. After deducting cost of books lost, excessive use of supplies, and laboratory breakage, this will be returned at the close of the school year. This deposit should be made at the time the student enrolls. Regular class work in all departments of the school will begin on Wednesday, September 4. Parents are respectfully requested to enroll their children at the beginning of the school term.

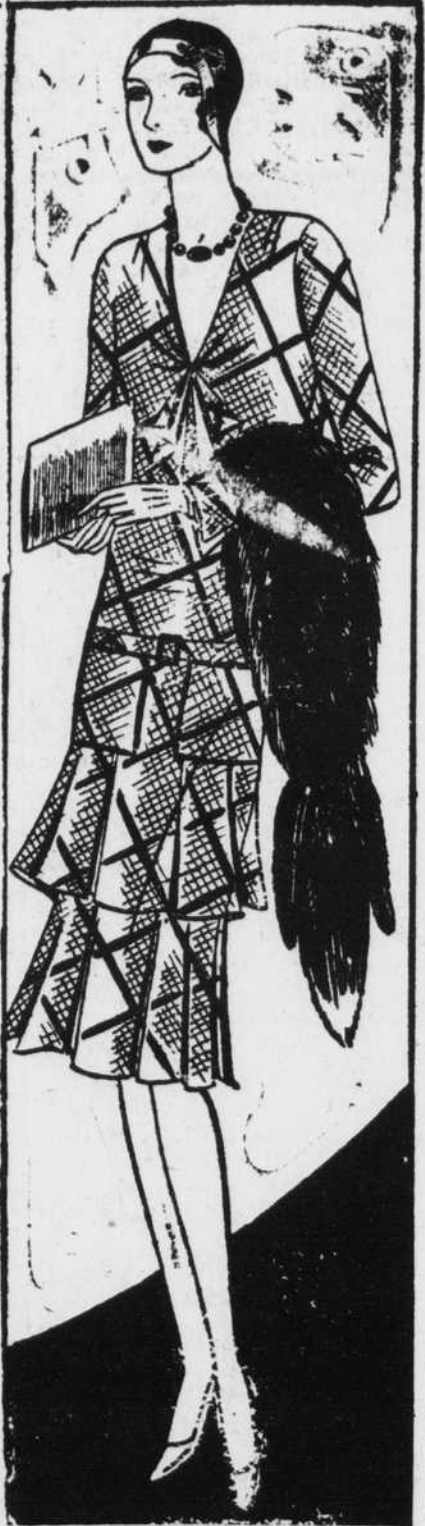

Kid Chocolate Whips Al Singer

(AP)—Kid Chocolate's record of victories was unbroken today, but only after furious 12-round battle in which the little Cuban Negro had to come from behind to win a close decision from Al Singer, Bronx boy, before 50,000—the largest crowd of the outdoor season—at the Polo Grounds last night. The gate receipts were about \$225,000. A whirlwind finish in the final round apparently gained Chocolate the votes of Referee Lou Magnolia and Judge Charles F. Mathison. The other judge, George Kelly, voted for Singer. Rising from a \$40 preliminary fighter, a little more than a year ago, Chocolate collected about \$50,000 for his share and today stands on the threshold of pugilistic greatness like no negro fighter since George Dixon and Joe Gans. Nothing of a decisive nature was accomplished at either conference, Mr. Clark stated.
