Pitiful scenes were enacted as grayhaired women shouted the names of their sons, and as wives, sweethearts and filends scanned faces, and screamed names in the hope that their loved ones would be among the 29 survivors aboard the Dodd

The rush toward the gangplank was so determined that a guard line was thrown about the place. Most of the 29 were taken from the ship over its side and rushed away in automobiles and taxicabs.






