

State Senator Expects Split Unit of 72 or More Members; Federal Inspectors Will Visit Soon, to Take Steps for Organization of Local Company; Battalion to Come Later

Steps toward the formation of a National Guard Unit in Las Vegas will be taken in the near future. it was announced here yesterday by Assemblyman Albert Duffill. who is commanding officer of Company E. 115th Combat Engineers, National Guard, Nevada.

Establisment of a Nevada Guard was made possible by a bill which Duffill was instrumental in having passed at the recent session of the state legislature, and federal inspectors from the Ninth Corps area are expected to visit here soon.

Recruiting will start about Ocber 15, according to Duffill, and it is expected at least 42 will enlist in Las Vegas, and .30 in the Moana Valley, giving Clark county a split unit of at least 72 members, and



U. S. Officials Will **Push** Investigation Today; Bodies of **Two Women Found.**

SAN FRANISCO, Sept. 2, (AP)-United States steamboat inspectors will continue tomorrow the investigation of the San Juan disaster which cost the lives of seventy-one oersons.

Testimony will be taken from the members of the crew of the oil tanker Dodd, which rammed the Ban Juan, and from survivors. But two bodies of those who perished have been recovered, both women. One was identified as Mrs. L. H. Mohler of Los Angeles. The inquest over the bodies will be held Thursday.

The coast guard reported two other bodies sighted, but the heavy fog caused them to be lost again


