UNION PACIFIC APPROVES.

DRESIDENT CARL R. GRAY of the Union Pacific in expressing his approval of the city park site for the federal building and his willingness to join with the city in conveying the tract to the government, has again shown the desire of the railroad to cooperate in all things possible for the betterment of Las Vegas.

President Gray, familiar with the conditions of Las Vegas, doubtless realizes the desirability of securing our federal building without delay. And he also, it appears, considers the site offered by the city and aproved by the government officials, a suitable one.

CHAMBER APPROVES.

THE CHAMBER of Commerce at its meeting Tuesday, gave its almost unanimous approval to the Stewart street site in the city park lands for the proposed government building.

It is so obvious that this site is the best and in fact the only suitable site available for the building.

We have heard it suggested that the government officials who were here for the purpose of selecting the site unduly stressed the necessity of prompt action.

The Age believes that \$20,000 is all we can hope to have appropriated for a site. The Age knows that if a site is not made available promptly Las Vegas will be unceremoniously dropped from the building program, much to the satisfaction of many other places.

We have the opportunity NOW to secure a government building which will be a credit to the city. If we delay, we delay not for a few weeks or months, but for several years-two at least.
