Eleven Persons Met Quick Death

Fatalities Occur In All Parts Of California Over Week End.—Automobiles Kill 5.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 9 (AP)—Eleven persons met with sudden death over the week end in California according to a survey by the United Press.

Five were the victims of automobile accidents, three committed suicide, one woman fell from a roller coaster at an amusement park, one man died of heart attack, and one was electrocuted.

U. S. Chamber Will Consider Many Problems

Western Divisional Meeting Will be Held at Ogden, Utah, Sept., 30 to Oct. 1, To Consider Western Problems.

Shall the West continue to prosper or be checked in its advance to a center of world importance by the denuding of the forestry lands? This is one question of great importance which the delegates to the Western Divisional meeting of the United States Chamber of Commerce at Ogden, Utah, September 30 and October 1, will consider.

Walter Mulford, Professor of forestry, University of California, who has said that the west shall rise or fall according to our management of our forested lands, will lead the discussion on this topic.

In making this announcement, Paul Shoup, western vice-president of the National Chamber, further states that the subject of Mexican immigration is also scheduled for thorough discussion to clarify all phases of the question.

Reclamation, of vital interest to every state of this western group, will also be a subject upon which National leaders will discuss at the Ogden conference.

Other speakers on the program will include: William Butterworth, president, Chamber of Commerce of the United States; Hon. George H. Dern, Governor of Utah, Salt Lake City; Dr. E. G. Peterson, president State Agricultural College, Logan; P. G. Spilsbury, president Arizona Industrial Congress, Phoenix; R. H. Rutledge, United States District Forester, Ogden; and Wesley O. Ash, District Manager, Bureau of Foreign and Domestic Commerce, San Francisco.

The headquarters will be at the Bigelow Hotel, Ogden.
