### **Hunting Season** Information for County Given

Deer, Fish, Quail, Rabbit and Duck Terms Stipulated; Rules Set by Legislature, County Commissioners.

Information concerning the hunting seasons in Clark and Lincoln counties for 1929, as set by the recent legislature, with supplementary rulings made by the Clark county commissioners, was released yester-day by County Clerk Wm. Scott. Resident hunting licenses are now

\$2.50, one dollar of which goes to the State Board of Fish and Game commissioners. The balance will go to the county. Non-resident licenses cost \$10, while allens are prohibited from hunting.

Fishing licenses are \$1.50. Licenses are procurable from the county clerk, game wardens and sporting goods dealers.

The deer season in Lincoln county is set for October 1 to 15, inclusive, and is set in Clark County for October 16 to 31, inclusive.

Hunters must obtain deer tags before hunting deer in Clark county. These tags cost \$1, and must be purchased in adition to the regular hunting licenses. This fee goes to the state board. The tag must be attached to the deer's horns and a part of the tag mailed to the state board at Reno.

The killing of does and spike bucks is prohibited. One buck is al-

lowed a year. The 1929 game law limits the quail season in all Nevada to 15 days. Clark county has set the season for November 16 to 30, inclusive. The bag limit is ten a day.

The cottontail rabbit season is November 1 to December 31, and the limit five a day.

The duck and goose season is September 16 to December 31. The limit is fiften ducks and five geese, and it is unlawful to hunt ducks or geese with any kind of rifle or pistol, or with shotgun larger than ten
