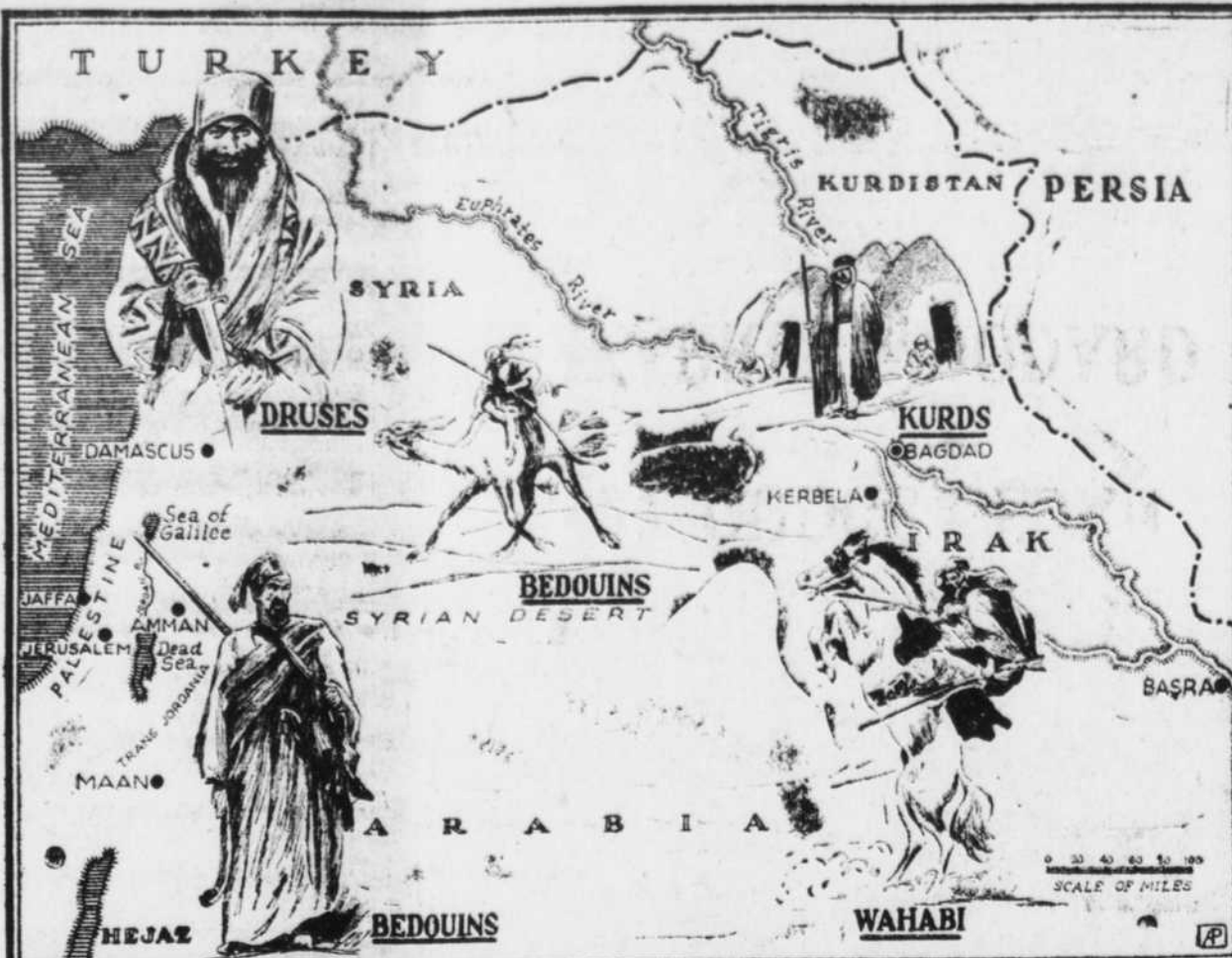

Unrest of Fierc Tribes Worries Near East



LONDON, Sept. 11 (AP)—In the background of the strife in Palestine growing out of the Walling Wall controversy has arisen the even graver problem of Moslem unrest throughout the Near East.

Around Palestine stretch other regions inhabited by various tribes, some of which constantly present the threat of raids and uprisings in districts under British and French mandate.

It is upon these tribes and their activities that the attention of the world centers when troubles develop which may inflame Moslem passion.

Bedouin raiders have been reported in the southern area of Trans-Jordan. Ibn Saud, king of the Hedjaz, rules over many thousands of square miles of the Arabian desert to the south and east of Trans-Jordan.

If news should leak through to some of the powerful desert sheiks under Ibn Saud that the Arabs in Palestine had begun anti-Jewish riots, which would occupy the attention of the British troops, air-

planes and armored cars, they probably would raid toward Amman and Maan.

Several years ago there was a concentrated Bedouin attack against Amman which was repulsed only after severe fighting and heavy Bedouin losses.

A concentrated attack, simultaneous with the disorders in Palestine, would be a serious factor.

To the north lies Syria, which is a French mandate. The French control Syria by force of arms. Damascus is filled with French soldiers and the central square is lined with armored cars. The Druses, who inhabit the Basalt covered mountains of the Harat Ar Rajal, are a warlike tribe and present the possibility that they again will rise and incite the Bedouins of the Syria desert to revolt. This would create a serious situation in the northern area.

Iraq, formerly known as Mesopotamia, is a British mandate. There have been several risings against British rule since the armistice, but the last few years peace and quiet have reigned the central area.

In the northern part of Mesopotamia raids have taken place. Sheiks and tribesmen disloyal to their king, Ibn Saud, have attacked outlying Iraq posts and attempted to attack and raze the holy cities of Kerbela and Nejeff.

A fanatical tribe, the Wahabi, believes that Allah can be worshipped anywhere and that it is contrary to the divine wish to worship in holy places. The Wahabi threatened to raze these towns and to put every inhabitant to death.

In the northern part of Iraq, the Kurds have always been a warlike people. There was a serious uprising in this region some years ago, but of late there has been no trouble.

The only serious danger in the Near and Middle east would be from a concentrated religious rising. There are so many Mohammedan factions that a general rising would seem impossible.

India is at present quiet, but there is always the possible danger of another rising or mutiny.
