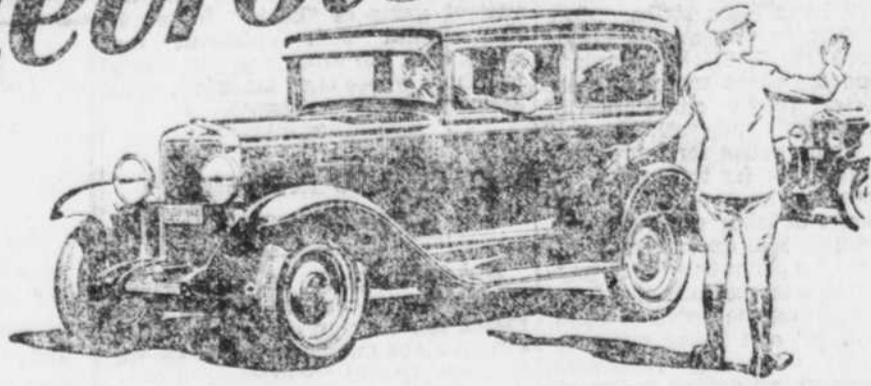

All three falls in the match, which lasted approximately half an hour, were taken with flying tackles. Stecher won the first fall but the champion came back and threw him twice in 31 minutes.

CHICAGO, Sept. 18, (U.P.)—The 1929 national league championship bunting next year will fly from the flagpole of Wrigley field in Chicago, for the Cubs this afternoon became a mathematical certainty to win the pennant.
