Gallagher Gets 15 Feet of Water

Water has been reached by a well on a tract eight miles south of Las Vegas on the Los Angeles highway. The land is to be improved by Pat Gallagher under the Pittman land act.

The well, which is being drilled by Filbey, is now down 105 feet. This is the first well in this locality, according to Gallagher. It is about 50 feet off the highway to the east.

Gallagher plans to prove up twenty acres for a patent there. There are eight feet of subsoil with no gypsum, he said.

Briton, Charged With Electricity, Can't Use Telephone, Ear Phones

PLYMOUTH, England, Sept. 18. (U.P.)—Frederick Stone, a chauffeur at Holsworthy, north Devonshire, is so charged with electricity, that:

1. He cannot use a telephone or wear a radio headphone without receiving a shock, and
2. He cannot drive his automobile or walk without wearing vulcanite insulation pads in his shoes, and
3. He can locate buried gold, silver and copper.

This strange "electrical" man has spent 20 of his 49 years in hospitals puzzling doctors.

A public test of his divining powers was held at Plymouth Municipal Museum under the supervision of the curator. The electric man located without trouble buried nuggets of gold, gold-bearing quartz and even gold jewelry.

Stone finds hidden gold and copper by means of a wand consisting of an ordinary steel clock spring. This wand twirls and wriggles in his hand like a snake when he approaches buried treasure. The number of wriggles denotes the number of feet he is away from the exact spot.

Discussing his unusual gift, Stone said that these divining spells put a great strain upon him and were always followed by periods of intense lassitude.

"The only way I can get relief from the electric currents when I am thus overcome," he said, "is to touch wood.

"I enjoy listening to the wireless by loud speaker but as soon as I put on a pair of headphones I feel physical helplessness as if I had received a blow on the head. I cannot use a telephone without intolerable discomfort.

"I once wore my wife's wrist watch and it came all to pieces. I must be supercharged with electricity.

"The shoes Stone wears have soles an inch thick made of old motor tires. Several doctors have decided that he suffers from some form of St. Vitus' dance.

Air Tour For Ford Trophy Attracts 35

Record Number of Entries To Visit 32 Cities in 20 States; 25,000,000 Will See Planes.

DETROIT, Mich., Sept. 18. (U.P.)—More than 25,000,000 persons will see the air fleet of the 1929 National Tour for the Edsel B. Ford trophy during its 16-day journey of nearly 5,000 miles, according to an estimate made by Ray Collins, manager of the event.

Thirty-five entries have been made thus far in the tour by leading airplane manufacturers, Collins said, and the competing fleet of planes will visit 32 cities in this country and Canada, passing through 20 states. The entry this year exceeds by 10 the largest list included in any of the four previous tours.

Hawkes to Referee
Frank Hawkes, who holds the trans-continental speed records from east-to-west, west-to-east and round trip, has been announced as tour referee and will precede the flight in the airplane with which he made his records.

The last word in modern airplane equipment has been placed in the tour, and persons along the route will see for the first time the famous Autogiro. Juan de la Cierva, inventor of the plane, has announced he himself will fly one of the three which have been entered.

The tour is an institution designed for promotion of civil aeronautics and as such does not include entry of government-owned equipment.

Cash Prizes of \$20,000
Besides the beautiful Ford reliability trophy approximately \$20,000 in cash prizes will be awarded.

The mileage to be traversed this year will be extensive, ranging from Portland, Me., to Jacksonville, Fla., along the Atlantic seaboard and then across the Middle Western states as far as Wichita, Kans.

French Troops Soon Out of Rhineland

PARIS, Sept. 18. (U.P.)—With the first homeward movement scheduled for shortly after Sept. 20, it was said from an authoritative source today that French troops will have completely evacuated the second Rhineland zone by the end of November. Complete orders concerning evacuation were received at the headquarters of General Dolphe Guillaumat at Mayence today. Pursuant to orders of the ministry of war, they were automatically transmitted to infantry units. The troops will occupy garrisons in Alsace Lorraine.
