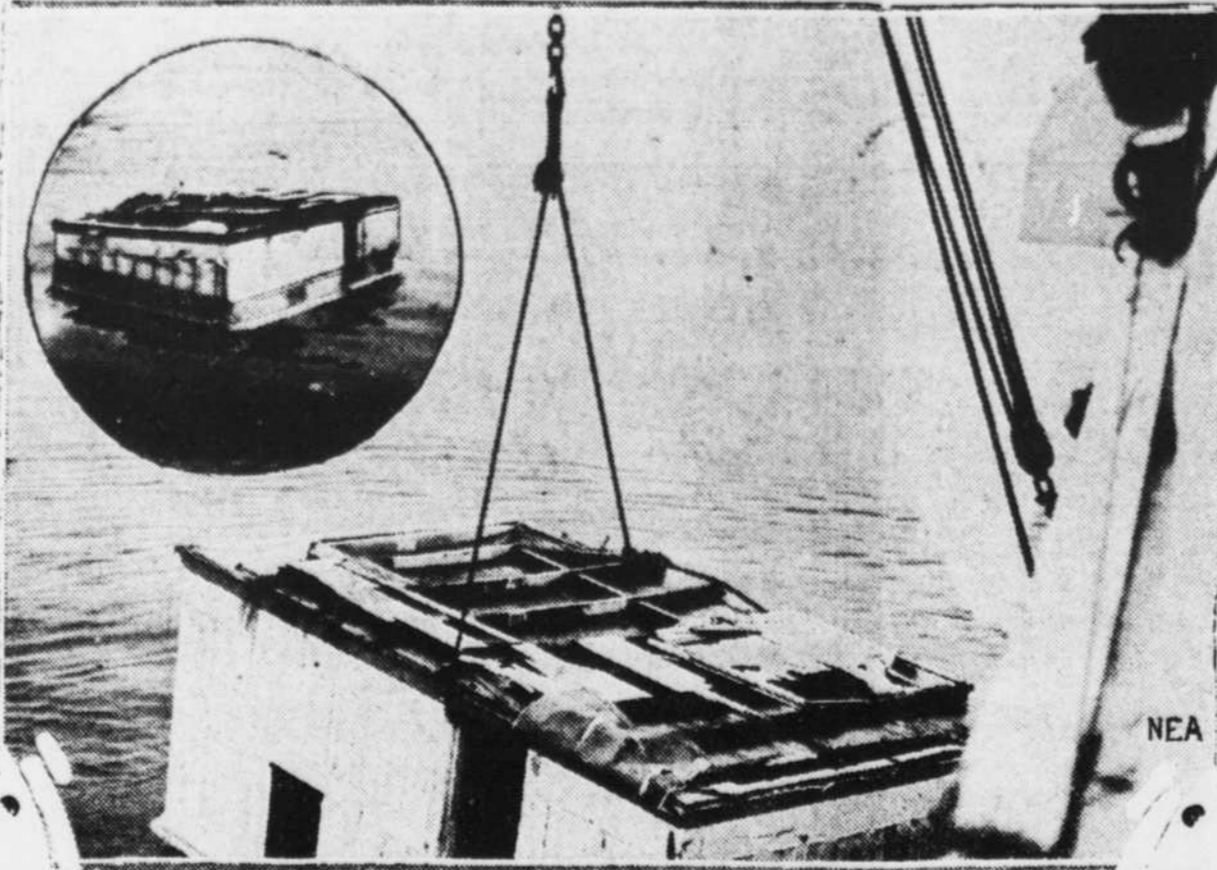
Mrs. Harry L. Blanding is entertaining about fifty ladies at a bridge luncheon today at the Canary Cottage.

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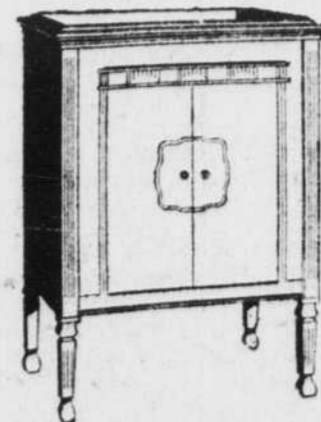
