War Casualty Has Undergone 34 Operations

But Vito Bruno, Wounded 11 Years Ago Today on Champagne Front, Is Still Cheerful After Years of Suffering.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 25, (U.P.)—Vito Bruno, just turned 31, today is celebrating at Walter Reed Hospital here the 11th anniversary of that memorable day in 1918 when after a particularly fierce engagement on the Champagne front he was given up for dead.

Despite the fact that all of those 11 years have been spent suffering in army hospitals where he has undergone 34 major operations, Bruno is known and beloved by all his comrades as the most cheerful patient in Walter Reed.

Last month at Walter Reed the 34th was performed; modern surgery went the limit to give game, cheerful Bruno a fighting chance.

"Tony," an immigrant born in Italy August 26, 1896, "Tony," as the boys at the hospital have nicknamed him, came to America in 1912. He settled in Scranton, Pa., and went to work in the coal mines. Strong, capable and willing, he made friends quickly. He was among the first to enlist when war was declared, and was assigned to the 37th division which was rushed to France and the front lines early in July.

Like his buddies he went through a baptism of fire, a world of whizzing shells, screaming bayonets and deadly gas. But he never "went West" one day.

The "zero-hour" was set for 5:30 on the morning of September 26, 1918. Over the top they went; the battle was fierce, desperate, bloody.

He dropped suddenly, a terrific pain in his right leg. A German machine gun bullet had broken the bone just below the knee. The splintered bones jutted from a jagged tear in his breeches. With no help in sight and the men around him busily engaged in killing and maiming each other, Bruno, faint from the shock and loss of blood, gamely unwrapped his puttee and bared the mangled leg.

"Bone Almost Rotted" He improvised a tourniquet with the aid of his shirt and the useless puttee and prepared to wait. For 72 hours he lay, without food or water, unable even to cry out. Finally he won—won his own private battle. He was picked up and sent to the nearest hut. But the suffering had just begun.

Osteomyelitis had rotted the bone nearly away. The months passed into years and still he survived, operator upon operation. With he kept up his happy disposition, always had a cheery smile for everyone. From hospital to hospital his cot was the headquarters of fun and gaiety.

"Stick with 'em" says Tony. "Smile. Always smile. It's the smartest way in the long run."

Shuler Talk Gets Contempt Charge

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 25, (U.P.)—Two Los Angeles ministers were ordered to appear in court here September 30 and show cause why they should not be held in contempt for remarks they broadcast on the conduct of the Mrs. Lois Pantage murder trial.

They are Rev. R. P. Shuler, pastor of Trinity Methodist Episcopal church, who announced before any evidence was taken that "the jury is hung and I can name the man who will hang it," and Rev. Gustav Bruegleb, pastor of St. Paul's Presbyterian church, who admitted he gave "information on the matter to Rev. Shuler."

The order for the two ministers to show cause why they should not be held in contempt was filed by Superior Judge Carlos B. Hardy, trial judge in the Mrs. Pantage case.

Two counts were preferred against Rev. Shuler and one against Rev. Bruegleb.

The citations ordered that answers to the charges must be filed before September 30 and that hearings on the matter would be held on that date.

Judge Hardy's action was taken on the recommendation of a special bar association committee, appointed to aid the court in sifting the accusations made by Rev. Shuler and Rev. Bruegleb.

The committee advised that the ministers be cited to explain their actions.

The investigation was started after it was brought to the court's attention that Rev. Shuler in a radio address had intimated an irregularity in the selection of the Mrs. Pantage jury.

The grand jury investigated the matter and held that the remarks were "irresponsible gossip."

Judge Hardy, himself, rebuked Rev. Shuler for making accusations without attempting to establish any proof. Rev. Shuler admitted at that time that his statements were merely rumors and they were founded mostly on information given him by Rev. Bruegleb.
