Eastern Publisher Divorced by Wife

Cecelia G. Wyckoff of New York City was granted a divorce from Richard D. Wyckoff of Las Vegas by Judge Orr in the District Court yesterday morning.

This announcement of itself is apparently of little news value, until the reader realizes that Mrs. Wyckoff is manager and principal owner of the Magazine of Wall Street, and that Mr. Wyckoff was the founder, and for many years the editor of the famous publication.

The complaint was filed September 3, 1929, by the Hon. Samuel Platt, prominent Reno attorney and Nevada statesman, and alleges extreme cruelty as the cause of action.

Testimony of Mrs. Wyckoff was taken by deposition and her case presented by her attorney, Mr. Platt, who was in Las Vegas for the occasion. The testimony of the plaintiff stated that in 1910 when she went to work on the magazine it was in a precarious financial condition, in fact almost insolvent, and by her efforts prospered to such an extent that in 1926 Mr. Wyckoff was paid \$500,000 for his half interest.

Mr. Wyckoff, who was represented by F. R. and Leo McNamee, did not contest the action.

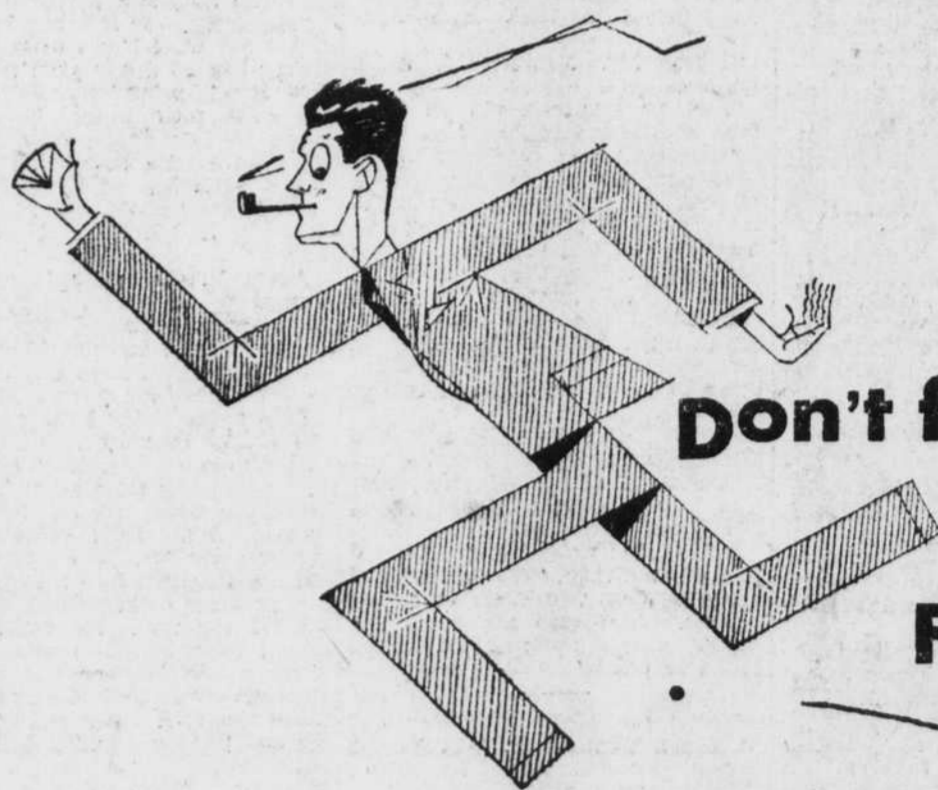
