### Russian Plane Is Safe in Alaska

SITKA, Alaska, Sept. 30, (U.P.)—After causing considerable alarm by flashing through the air an S. O. S. the monoplane, "Land of the Soviets," bearing four Russian aviators on a Moscow to New York flight was safe at anchor today and being prepared for a takeoff for Seattle probably Tuesday.

The fliers landed here from Seard at 4:45 p. m. (6:45 p. m. eastern standard time) yesterday after six and three quarters hours continuous flight. They were two hours behind schedule in arriving here, having been delayed by thick fog.

An S. O. S. signal sent out by the planes radio operator was a mistake, it was explained on the arrival of the fliers.

**TOKIO, Sept. 30, (U.P.)**—The Empress Masako gave birth to a daughter at 6:15 a. m. today. Due to some misunderstanding of a telephone communication from the royal palace an announcement was broadcast from the capital that the infant was a boy and that an heir had at last been born to the throne. The erroneous report caused the beginning of nationwide rejoicing, which changed into gloom and disappointment when the press announced the truth. The newspapers assailed the central broadcasting station for its carelessness, and it was understood that officers of the station were resigning because of the error.

**ABOARD S. S. BERENGARIA, Sept. 30, (U.P.)**—Premier J. Ramsay MacDonald has accepted Mayor Walker's invitation to stop over in New York long enough to have the freedom of the city conferred upon him.

Key West also received a message from the coast guard cutter, Sautee, concerning the steamer Scandia, grounded 40 miles south of Miami, it said:

"Scandia total wreck. Have taken off five men. Due to very sloppy sea for small boats has discontinued for night and laying to off Molasses reef."

(Lloyd's register lists two Scandias, both Danish vessels. One is an 8,542 ton tanker owned by the Danish Petroleum Company. The other Scandia is of 1,866 tons registry.)
