HURRICANE NEWS.

THE WEST Indian hurricane which caused considerable damage the past week in the south and along the Atlantic Coast, has been acting queerly. Coming south westward from the Bahama's, it veered to the south into the Gulf of Mexico where it stalked about for several days as if in an uncertain state of mind.

While it meandered here and there, Uncle Sam's weather bureau kept close track of it and was able to keep the people warned ahead of the storm's appearance so that much damage was averted by precautions.

PUSHING POWER CONTRACTS.

Women Earning Fame In Fields Of Exploration

WASHINGTON, Oct. 2. (UP)—The old adage that "Woman's place is in the home" has been discarded by women geographers of the twentieth century, who believe that their "place" also may be under the Northern Lights at the Antarctic Barrier, or in the heart of Malayan jungle.

The Society of Women Geographers, organized in 1925 by Harriet Chalmers Adams to establish a medium of contact between women of the United States and other countries engaged in geographical work and allied sciences, has just published its first general report showing world-wide explorations by women.

The five continents come within the scope of the women geographers, and the adventures chronicled range from tiger hunting in Sumatra to mummy hunting in Egypt. Devil's Island, a penal colony in French Guiana, and the highest peak of the Peruvian Andes are equally a lure to the eager interest of the women scientists.

Although the present report does not say as much, Mrs. Adams is credited by Hispano-American authorities with perhaps the most thorough knowledge possessed by any person of the regions now or formerly under the Spanish or Portuguese flags. She has visited practically every spot of Iberian occupation in the world, and has written of most of those countries. Her explorations have continued notwithstanding a serious injury in Spain two years ago.

Among the activities of more than a hundred women scientists the following are typical: Mary Hastings Bradley has been writing the story of her travels in the Padang Highlands in Sumatra, and is planning travels into French Equatorial Africa.

Marian Bell Fairchild in recent years has accompanied her husband on his search for rare plants in Java, Ceylon, North and West Africa. Dr. Margaret Mead has spent the greater part of the past year on the Admiralty Islands, of the Mismarck Archipelago, where she has learned the language of the natives on the Island of Manus.
