M'DONALD WELCOMED BY HOOVER

America and Britain Will Seek to Push World Peace, Says Premier on Visit.

One of the momentous days in the history of the United States and Great Britain came to a climax tonight when Prime Minister Ramsay MacDonald was ushered into the Blue Room at the White House to be received by President Hoover as strengthen friendship between the two peoples.

The prime minister and his daughter, Miss Ishbel, arrived in Washington at 4 p. m. after a four straightaways in all. welcome celebration in New York. The full significance of the visit

of the British Prime Minister, the first such in American history, began to dawn tonight.

From both sides it was emphasized there is to be no Anglo-American alliance as alliances are contrary to the historical policies of this nation. Prime Minister MacDonald declared on the contrary that the two countries are attempting to set an example to all other nations to gather round the council board of peace.

The Premier arrived at the White House at dusk. The meeting between President Hoover and Mac-Donald was for a brief 20 minutes extremely formal and without any of the opportunities for easy friendly discussion which will come when they spend a weekend together.
