The fee to be charged traveling shows and carnivals for appearance in the open air or under tents will be increased from \$50 to \$100 a day beginning October 10, according to an ordinance passed by the city council Thursday evening.

This will apply to traveling shows, traveling skating rinks, circuses, hippodromes, or carnivals intending to exhibit in the open air or under a tent or in any public hall, club room, assembly hall or theater where moveable scenery and theatrical appliances are used.
