NEW VICAR COMES TO LOCAL CHURCH

(Continued From Page One) Gautama Buddha, the founder of the spiritual religion of Buddhism, was born in 500; the Jewish prophet, Isaiah, the inspired writer of the Servant Songs, which reflect the highest mystical conception of Judaism and the noblest preparation for the coming of The Christ as the Suffering Servant of God, was working among the Hebrew exiles in Babylon in the year 500; and the marvelous Age of Pericles was at its height in Greece about the fifth century before Christ.

Confucius was the author of the ancestral religious customs and the moral teachings that have molded 400,000,000 of Chinese for 2000 years. Buddha's inspired life and writings have become the religion not only of India but also of Japan and the Eastern Isles. The great prophet of the Exile prepared the hearts and minds of all believers in the One Supreme God for the understanding of Jesus life of sacrifice and the whole sacramental life of the Christian church. Socrates, Plato, Aristotle, among the Greek philosophers, Homer and the classical poets, Aeschylus and the other dramatists, and Pheidias and the rest of the sculptors, all flourished about the same time. The works of these men still set the standards of perfection in the arts of civilization.

In the far-flung corners of the civilized world of antiquity were thus born the great inspired authors whose works still remain as the most wonderful creations of humanity.

Surely no one can doubt that the same One Great God of the whole universe inspired these various geniuses, though each interpreted his inspiration in terms of his experience and the need of the times.

It looks to the impartial observer as if the life of civilized man had about the year 500 B. C., reached such a height of spiritual understanding that God could at last reach through to the human heart and mind with his choicest ideas and ideals for the progress of his children on earth. It was the most spiritually receptive age of man's history compared with which there has never been anything like it.

It certainly suggests that inspiration as the method of God to guide man's highest life depends on human preparation rather than on the will of God. God is ever ready and anxious to teach his children all the wisdom of which they are capable of understanding. It rests with men to open their hearts and spirits to the inflow of the Holy Spirit of God and then give their creative ideas to their fellow men.

All, however humble or wise, can receive something of the inspiration of God. In fact it is no uncommon experience for men to have brought ideas which come to them at odd flashing moments. And it behooves all of us to treasure such ideas whenever they are vouchsafed to us.

The practical lesson from this striking historical incident is the fact that God is seeking to speak to us all the time; but we need to be more open and receptive toward Him and to be seeking Him on our part. And God has provided a special means of helping us in such seeking through the Christian church and her sacraments.
