Most common cause of presentday duels, as in the heydey of gallantry when D'Artagnan and Scarlet Pimpernels stalked abroad ready to defend a lady's name at the slightest whisper, is "the fair name of a woman." In polite society, a word spoken out of place, a meaning smile, a nudge when some fair courtesan enters admist the crowd in a fashionable salon is enough to

arouse the wrath of a lover. If all the quarrels which begin this way were allowed to take their course, the secluded parks around Paris would probably be littered with corpses daily. Happily friends often succeed in intervening to appease wounded honor and preserve boiling blood from being spilled in

The calcio-colberthite ore will make a 15 per cent oxide concentrate, with ore, small values in gold and silver

them, but with little or no pay for the lead and other by-products. This is not a good price but it is a living price, until a better way of

marketing can be provided. When the vanadic oxide is taken out of the concentrate it sells for from \$20 to \$50.

There are several methods available for reducing vanadium concentrates. In the U. S. Bureau of Mines, in Reno, a process has been worked out, upon concentrates from Goodsprings, that seems very practical. By it 90 per cent of the vanadic oxide is recovered, in a marketable form, and practically all the lead is saved, together with the gold and silver. A fair percentage of the copper and zinc is also taken

The cost of treating a ton of concentrates by this process will be about \$75, and it will just about double the amount realized from vanadium concentrates.

Such a plant will cost about \$20,-000 to install, and the Bureau of Mines estimates that it should have an assured tonnage of four tons per day With sufficient concentrating fa-

cilities, the vanadium mines of Goodsprings can produce six to ten tons of concentrates per day, and at a profit characteristic of mining operations in this district.

The consumption of vanadium runs up into millions of dollars every year, and more would be used if it were available. Prices are quite satisfactory and have changed but little in the past eight years. Its principal use is an alloy in steel, iron and bronze, though some is used in the making of dyes, and, of late years, an increasing amount is being used as a catalyst, or precipitating agent, in the production of
