

Trial Today For Girl Involved in Shooting of Foot

Georgia May Wolliver believed involved in the shooting of Cecil Wolliver through the foot Monday morning, is scheduled to appear for hearing this morning, her trial having been postponed.

An X-ray taken day before yesterday at the Las Vegas hospital showed one of the bones of Wolliver's foot to be crushed by the bullet, and pieces of lead lodged in the bone.

The young man will go to his home shortly, it is planned, and it will take about six weeks for the foot to heal, according to Dr. N. Michelen. It will heal completely however, the doctor predicted, although pieces of the lead will remain in the bone.
