Her physician, Dr. E. C. Fishbaugh, said he had ordered two more nurses to the bedside. He said the nervous strain of her trial contributed to her critical condition. The penalty for manslaughter is one to ten years in San Quentin.

 1 cup light brown sugar
 1 egg
 1 teaspoon cloves
 2 teaspoons cinnamon
 1-4 teaspoon salt
 2 tablespoons molasses
 2-3 cup sour milk
 2 cups flour
 1 teaspoon soda
 1 teaspoon vanilla
 Cream the fat and sugar. Add the rest of the ingredients and beat for 2 minutes. Pour into a loaf pan, which has been fitted with waxed paper. Bake in a moderately slow oven for 35 minutes.
