

Mrs. Pantages Now Said Critically Ill With Pneumonia

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 18, (U.F) Mrs. ois Pantages, who recently was convicted of manslaughter as a result of the automobile collision death of Juro Rokumoto, Japanese gardener, was reported seriously ill with pneumonia today.

Her physician, Dr. E. C. Fishbaugh, said he had ordered two more nurses to the bedside. He said the nervous strain of her trial contributed to her critical condition. The penalty for manslaughter is one to ten years in San Quentin.
