George Marshall Admitted to Bar

Young Lawyer Makes Three District Court Appearances on Day After Notification Utah Motion Accepted.

Not only was George Marshall admitted to the Nevada bar this week, but he made district court appearances in three cases here yesterday, the first day after said admission.

Marshall was issued his certificate Thursday by the State Supreme court, on motion from Utah, where he engaged in private practice for two years.

He was deputy county attorney for Salt Lake county for one term, he stated yesterday, coming to Las Vegas May 20, 1929, to become affiliated with the law firm of Harmon and Salter.

"I expect to continue with that firm," he said.

Marshall graduated from the University of Utah law school in 1924.

The three cases in which Marshall made appearance yesterday before District Judge William E. Orr were those of Jacomini vs. Marion Wilson, Minnie L. Pyle vs. Harley Pyle and Beatrice Stahl vs. Floyd Stahl. The latter two cases were divorce suits, and both were granted, the former on grounds of desertion and the latter for cruelty.

Moving of Equipment Completed; Air Mail Schedule to be Standardized; Phone Line Is Promised.

The Western Air Express planes are now landing at the new Los Vegas Nevada airport eight miles north of the center of town.

The old landing field was abandoned yesterday morning, when final moving of equipment from the field was completed.

Air mail is being brought in from the new field in the same manner as before, but the closing schedule for the out-going airmail pouches is being standardized, dropping of the flexible schedule depending upon the planes' arrival time being necessitated by lack of phone line to the new field.

The Western Air Express has agreed to eventually put a phone line to the field, P. A. Simon, head of the Las Vegas Nevada Airport, Inc., stated yesterday.
