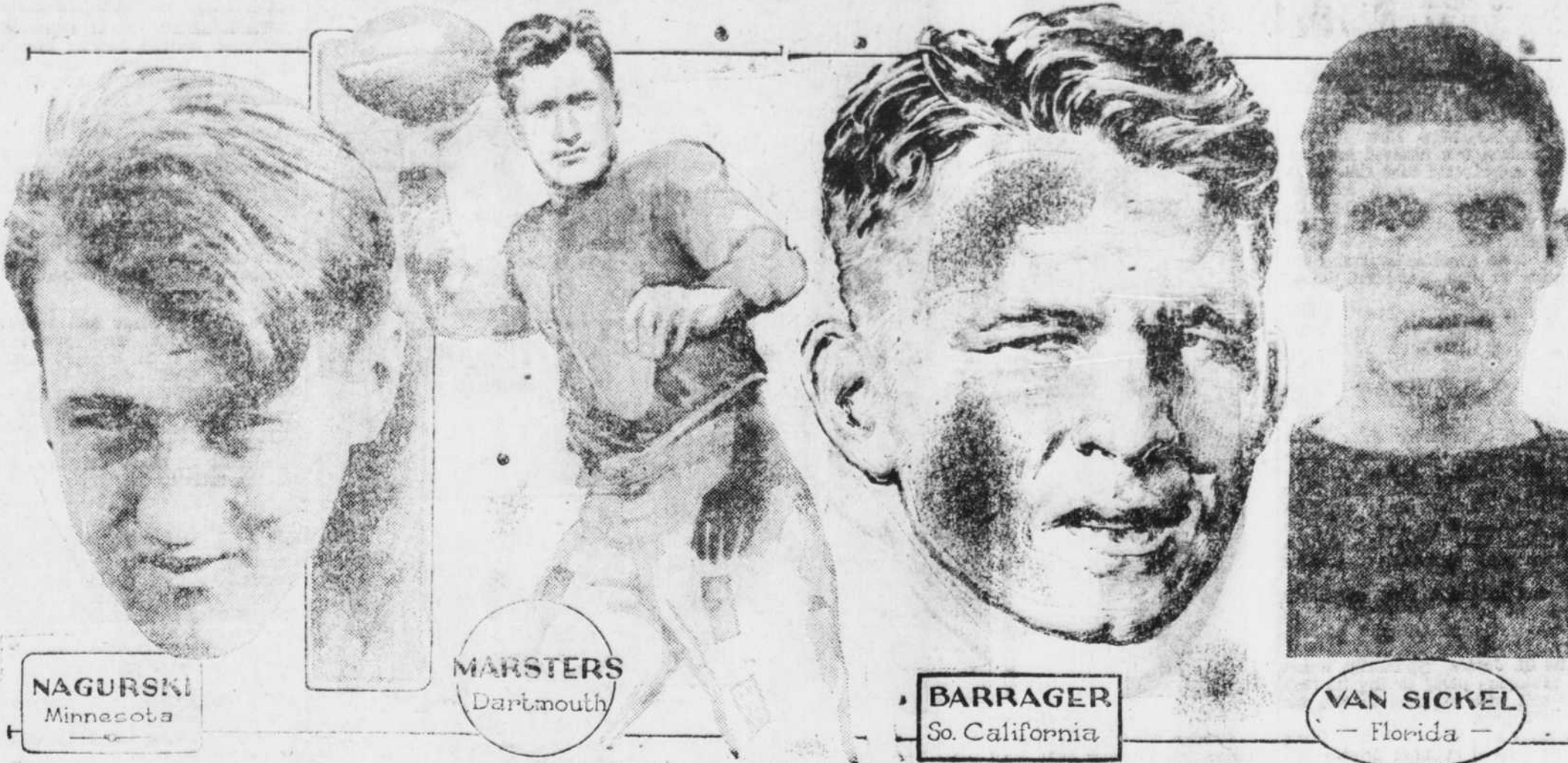

Standing off the rush of the new stars, such seasoned men as Nagurski, Minnesota; Marsters, Dartmouth; Van Sichel, Florida, and Barrager, Southern California, still rate among the top notchers in their respective regions.

For instance Al Masters, Dartmouth's great quarterback, is holding his own against the best in the east. The same can be said about Dale Van Sichel of Florida, in the south; Bronko Nagurski of Minnesota, in the mid-west, and Captain Nat Barrager of Southern California in the far-west.

Marsters, the nation's high scorer, has been champing around in his best 1927 form and has helped the Big Green to a dominant position in the east. Van Sichel, All-American end in 1927, started poorly this year because of between season sickness but he has reached his stride and against Georgia was the best man on the field. He blocked a punt and converted a pass into a touchdown.

Nagurski, Minnesota's handy man, is among the very best football players in the middle west. He plays tackle or fullback. What the "Old Nag" does in Minnesota's remaining conference for the Big Ten title. Captain Nat Barrager of Southern California gave up his old center post this year to accommodate George Dye, a transfer from Alabama, and became a guard. This gave him an opportunity to show just how good he is. He still ranks among the far west's leading linemen. Barrager drew All-American mention in 1928. He may do better this year.

Senate Censures Bingham For Tariff Action

The senate today officially censured Senator Hiram Bingham, Republican, Connecticut, for employing secretly an agent of the Connecticut Manufacturers association to assist him in connection with the pending tariff bill.

This action was taken when the senate adopted the censure resolution of Senator Norris, republican, Nebraska, by a vote of 54 to 22.

The resolution does not call for the resignation of Bingham nor for any other action but is only an expression of the sense of the senate.

Asked after the vote if he intended to resign, Bingham replied: "I certainly do not."

He declined to make further comment upon the action of the senate. The resolution adopted as the packed chamber sat in solemn silence expressed the sentiment of the senate that the employment
