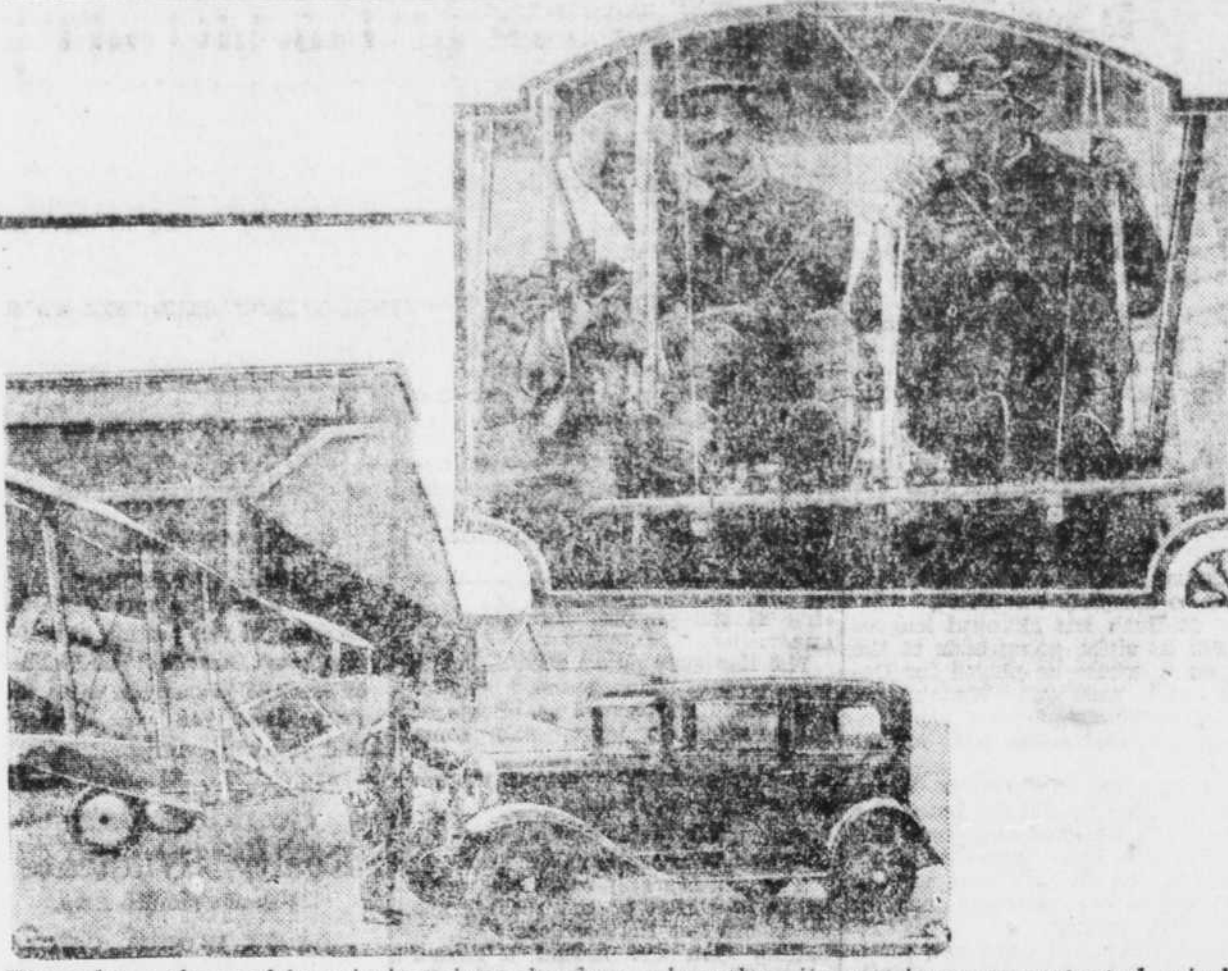

**Huge New Western Union Building In New York Will Add Splash Of Unique Coloring to City's Skyline**

To New York's world-famous skyline the new Western Union building has added a splash of color.

Nineteen shades of an entirely new building color on the exterior of the world's largest telegraph building present a striking contrast to the somber hues of other skyscrapers on Manhattan Island.

While a small army of workmen toils to complete the interior, the exterior of the future telegraphic center of the world catches and radiates the sunshine in a display of color.

Starting with a reddish brown at the base, the outside brick of the building is lighter and lighter in coloring up to the twenty-fourth story, at the top, which is a bright salmon. The shades are so blended that the eye cannot detect where they change each twenty-nine feet.

As the northernmost of the group of skyscrapers on the lower end of Manhattan Island, the building with its large ornamental buttresses and its gradual setbacks fills a sizable space in the large gap between the skyscraper groups in lower and mid-Manhattan.

**Larger Than Woolworth**  
Larger than the Woolworth building, the structure, covering the block bounded by Hudson, Worth and Thomas streets and West Broadway, is so massive that its height of 271 feet above the sidewalk is not so apparent as that of its slender sisters.

The gross floor area of the building is 1,040,478 square feet, and the useable area is 729,035, as compared with the 538,933 square feet of rentable area of the Woolworth building. The Western Union building contains 15,774,400 cubic feet of space as compared with 13,200,000 cubic feet in the Woolworth building.

The building, ready for operation, will represent an expenditure of about \$513,500,000. It eventually will accommodate about 7,000 Western Union employees, and will be used by 4,000 from the outset.

**Special Ceilings**  
Special acoustical-treated ceilings for operating rooms, a ventilating system requiring 370 horsepower to operate, special laboratory rooms to be maintained at constant temperature and humidity, thousands of ducts, conduits and pneumatic tubes, and other devices will make the building the most scientific and modern telegraph building in the world, engineers declare.

For the present not all of the floors will be occupied by Western Union. The Hudson street end of the first floor and first mezzanine will contain rentable areas. The fourth, fifth, sixth and seventh floors will be rented for offices.

The main floor will contain an auditorium capable of seating 980 people. This will be used for lectures to the company personnel, commencement exercises of company schools, plays and other purposes.

**Twenty-Five Tubes**  
The lobby will be lined with three shades of brick, with a marble base.
