was also made by Mathews. He asked that the board be composed as follows: Los Angeles, one member; Southern California Edison company, one member; Metropolitan Water district two members and the federal government one member or more and given no ex-

Mathews request that the federal government install the dam's machinery as well as the power house and that the dam be constructed to he greatest feasible height.

Mathews said the City of Los Aneles had saved its citizens \$25,000,- made up. 000 by producing and distributing its own municipal power and that further saving could be effected if and in need of rebuilding. the city were given adequate power from Boulder dam. Under the Wilbur allocation, it will receive 25 por cent, the same amount that was granted the Southern California Edison company.

Nevada's claim to one third of the dam's power was conceded by Mathews. He said he thought Los Angeles, as operator of the dam, and Nevada could work out a satisfactory scheme whereby the state could withdraw power as it needed and turn it back when the demand de-

Harland G. Palmer, representative of the Mayor of Los Angeles, and editor of the Hollywood Citizen, supported the objections made by other Los Angeles delegates to the allotment to the California Edison company

"Private corporations are seeking do only two things with this money: improve service or reduce rates. If paid out in dividends."

Palmer said he had made an eisound public sentiment in Los An- tute director, will be guests of K. O. geles and found it opposed the allocation of power to the Edison company. He said it was the popular belief there that Pasadena, Burbank and other nearby cities denied power from the dam, would have to purchase it from this private company despite their priority rights under the Boulder dam act.

Mayors B. F Delanty of Pasadena, H. E. Bruce of Burbank and C. E. Mimlin of Glendale, all California cities, protested Wilbur's allocation of only 4 per cent of the power to the smaller cities of California They contended it was not enough. Delanty said Pasadena alone would use the entire 4 per cent. Cimlin objected on the ground Wilbur had given the Southern California Edison company more power than all of the cities and said such action was "not consistent with the principles of public priority in the use of national resources."
