L. A. Residents Are Cautioned To Save Water

Shortage Seriously Affecting Many Pacific Coast Cities; Conservation is Needed, Say Officials.

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 29 (UP)—Giving as its reason the water shortage which it seriously affects many Pacific coast sections, the Board of Water and Power Commissioners has urged every resident of Los Angeles and Southern California to recognize his duty to aid in the conservation movement...

Following the appeal for conservation in the use of water, the commission made public that a condemnation suit was filed last Monday by the City of Los Angeles to secure the use of practically all water in the Mono basin.

The suit seeks only the use of the water and does not include the land, except those parcels required for rights of way to bring the water into the Owens river watershed.

It is planned to construct a storage reservoir and then to run an 11-mile tunnel under the ridge between Mono basin and the Owens valley to the south.

In commenting on the commission's request to save water, Col. E. B. Hersey, chief of the local United States weather bureau, declared that while there was no prospect of rain for several days there was nothing to indicate that it would be a dry season.

SEATTLE, Nov. 29 (UP)—Street lamps have been darkened and electric signs left unlighted here in the city's first curtailment of the use of electric power.

Further curtailment, however, will be necessary within a few days, according to Assistant Supervisor Glen Smith of the city light department, unless a heavy rain replaces the water in the reservoirs of the municipal hydro-electric power plants.

Road Work Near Vegas Pushed

Boyer Will Spend Three Days in Carson City Next Week At Meeting of Highway Engineers.

The State Highway department survey for the improvement work to be done probably next year between Glendale and a point five miles north of Glendale is going ahead, under direction of State Highway Division Engineer C. C. Boyer.

The budget for next year, which will determine what improvement and construction work will be done, is being worked out by the department heads in Carson City, and, it is hoped, will provide for this improvement.

Boyer will spend three days next week in Carson City at the semi-annual conference of department heads and division engineers, where general problems of road building and maintenance, and specific plans for the future, will be discussed. He will leave Wednesday for the state capital and the meeting will be Thursday, Friday and Saturday.

A new truck will be brought back from Carson City by a driver who will accompany Boyer to the capital. The new truck will replace an old one now in service here, it was stated yesterday.

The eight mile detour from the Oasis camp to a point about ten miles out the highway toward Salt Lake City will be necessary for about ten days more, Boyer said yesterday.

A three-mile stretch from seven to ten miles from this city is being scarified and oil added to the surface.
