## Ship Hulks Used as Gambling Barges To Be Eliminated

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 2 (UP)—The United States coast guard today started a drive to eliminate ship hulks from use along the California coast as fishing or gambling barges. Captain D. F. A. De Otte, division commander, said that such hulks were a menace to navigation of passenger and freight ships, also in constant danger of sinking with loss of life.

The gambling barge Montfalcone, towed in two months ago after being rated a menace, has again taken up its position off Long Beach, Captain De Otte said.

A coast guard cutter is being dispatched to make inspection of the Montfalcone's life saving equipment. If this conforms with regulations the vessel will not be disturbed.

### W. U. Office Now Open 24 Hours

### Repeater System Installation Finished; Local Station Is Now One of Most Important in State.

The Las Vegas office of the Western Union Telegraph company went on a twenty-four hour schedule yesterday morning, when the testing and repeating office was cut in.

The installation of the repeating system and other expansions have made this office one of the most important in the state.

The personnel of the office, announced by Charles E. Lipton, manager, is now as follows: Charles E. Lipton, manager; I. S. Gilmer, chief operator and wire chief; J. T. Carl, assistant wire chief; O. C. Cooper, assistant wire chief; Elizabeth Nickels, Simplex operator; Beatrice Fulcher, chief clerk; Mary Stockburger, clerk; Wilford Blier, Elsmore Forbes, Howard Wasden and Evan Wasden, messengers.

Two Simplex-Duplex machines were installed in the office with the other equipment. It was explained that this is the latest method of sending and receiving messages and that the operator is able to send and receive at the rate of 60 words a minute.

The machines are operated by girls trained in this particular line of work. The Morse telegraph will be kept only for emergency and will be put into service only as needed, it is said.

J. E. Slineback, division wire chief, explained that the entire new equipment is the last word in up-to-date instruments for sending and receiving messages.

The energy for the equipment will be made by nine motor generators. These will also supply electricity for the Union Pacific telegraph lines in this vicinity.

The day and night will be divided into three shifts and there will be an operator on duty at all times, it is said. There will be an emergency unit installed, in about 15 days, to supply the power for the lines and equipment. This unit consists of a large gas engine and generator connected to a three-phase alternator. A 100-gallon tank for gasoline will also be placed under ground, and it was stated that the amount of gas would run the engine about 90 hours continuously.

According to Mr. Slineback, the local office is now capable of handling business for a town of 200,000 people without inconvenience. This

PAWNEE, Okla., Dec. 2 (UP)—Tom Vernon, 44, ex-convict and one time cowboy and actor in Western movie thrillers, confessed here tonight he wrecked a Southern Pacific train at Saugus, California, November 10, an robbed its passengers, according to announcement of Deputy Sheriff Thomas Higgins, who trailed the prisoner here from the West.

Vernon denied he had committed the second robbery which occurred under similar circumstances in Wyoming a few weeks ago. Higgins said the prisoner expressed willingness to face the charge in California without formal extradition but said he would fight against being removed to Wyoming.

Vernon has served time in Pennsylvania, Ohio and three terms in California on theft and forgery charges. He had been released from Folsom prison a few weeks before the California train robbery. Higgins said Vernon believed his parents were Jim Averill and 'Cattle Kate,' who were lynched in Wyoming 40 years ago, allegedly for cattle rustling.

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 2 (UP)—Governor C. C. Young will ask the governors of Oklahoma and Wyoming to permit California to extradite Tom Vernon, suspected train wrecker, it was announced here today.

Vernon, wanted in Wyoming and here on train wrecking charges, was arrested Sunday in Pawnee, Oklahoma.

The local sheriff's office said it had received the assurance of the governors office that every effort will be made to bring the suspect here.

Deputy sheriffs hope to claim the \$5,000 reward posted by the Southern Pacific for the arrest and conviction of the wrecker.

OMAHA, Neb., Dec. 2 (UP)—Immediate extradition to Wyoming of Tom, "Buffalo" Vernon, rodeo performer and ex-convict, to stand trial for wrecking and robbing the Portland Limited last week, was demanded by W. M. Jeffers, general manager of the Union Pacific railroad, today. The death penalty will be demanded if Vernon is placed on trial, train robbery being a capital offense in Wyoming.

Vernon was arrested in Pawnee, Okla., Sunday night as he left a bus from Tulsa.

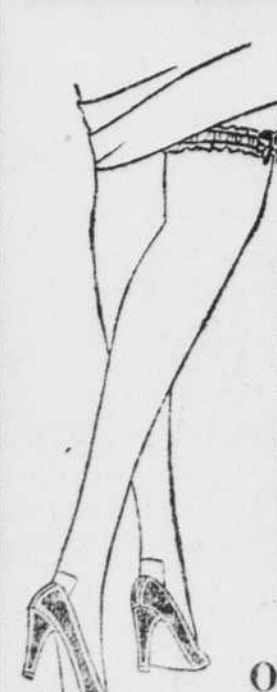
