

Chamber Talks By-Law Changes

Plans For Reorganization Presented By Secretary Donly; Committee to Re- port Next Meeting.

The Las Vegas Chamber of Commerce yesterday noon held a special meeting for the purpose of considering plans for a general reorganization in accordance with a recent vote of the board of directors.

Mrs. Florence Conely, secretary-manager of the chamber, presented a series of changes in the by-laws which she believed would be beneficial. After a general discussion of the changes involved, the matter of new by-laws was referred to a committee consisting of Senator A. S. Henderson, R. B. Griffith, C. D. Breeze, Dr. W. S. Park and C. O. Lauritzen, for report at the next meeting.

The changes advised by the secretary include the following:

Make all membership dues \$25 per year.

Establish a budget fund to which such members as are able and willing may contribute.

Nominate directors at a regular meeting instead of by committee.

Directors elect to select the president and other officers.

Provide for an executive committee of the board, to consist of five or seven members.

A rearrangement of committees, providing for 20 committees, the chairman of each to be appointed by the president from members of the board of directors.

Make the weekly luncheon meetings of the membership instead of the directors.

Rabies Epidemic Still Dangerous

Dog In Last Stages Killed Yesterday; Police Give Warning; Four Persons Taking Treatment.

Several dogs, one in the final stages of rabies, were killed yesterday by the police department in its war against the dread contagion.

Negative returns from Carson City on a dog's head and a cat's head sent recently for analysis showed that the two animals had not been infected with rabies.

Still, however, the contagion is considered enough to be dangerous, according to police, and two adults and two children are known to be taking treatments to forestall any possibility of the disease developing as the result of bites sustained by them.

Cooperation of the public is asked by the police, who hope by keeping dogs out of circulation, to stem the ravages of the disease without any human casualties.

Should any person be bitten, the police suggest, the dog which did the biting should be fastened up and under observation.

Whether or not the dog had rabies can be determined more quickly by observation of the live dog than by killing the animal and sending its head for examination, it is stated.

Two Held in Death Ontario, Calif., Dec. 6. (U.P.)—The body of Earl Whittle, 41, 70-lb. man, was found in his burned automobile on the highway three miles northwest of Uplands today.

Two men, giving the names, Harold Williams and Robert Thompson, were placed under technical arrest for questioning, and the coroner announced an inquest for late this afternoon.

Police at Uplands said Whittle's car was parked at a roadside with the brakes set. Footprints were found around the machine, it was said.

Williams and Thompson, according to police, were arrested in an automobile nearby.

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 6. (U.P.)—A resolution recommending that Los Angeles aid the cities of Tacoma and Seattle to obtain electrical power from U. S. battleships to be sent to the north was referred to a committee for consideration when it was presented before city council today.

The measure asked that council join with the two northern cities in appealing to the secretary of the navy to place a battleship or two at the disposal of Tacoma and Seattle.

Robbers Get \$50,000 MILWAUKEE, Dec. 6. (U.P.)—The Layton Park bank was held up by four bandits here this afternoon. Eight employees and patrons were in the bank when the robbers drew up to the door in a Ford touring car and rushed into the building, flourishing pistols.

First reports said bank officials estimated \$50,000 was obtained.

Makes California Home LOS ANGELES, Dec. 6. (U.P.)—Amelito Galli-Curci, opera singer, and her husband, Homer Samuels, concert artist, have decided to make Southern California their permanent home, according to an announcement by Jaw Lawyer, manager of the Palos Verdes estates, who said the diva had purchased a home site and would build there in 1931.

Find Pilot's Body CLEVELAND, Dec. 6. (U.P.)—The body of Thomas P. Nelson, mail pilot killed in the crash of his plane last Monday, will be taken to his home in Plainsfield, N. J., today.

A HINT OF RAIN AND THEN COAST FINDS SELF DRY AGAIN

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 6. (U.P.)—Outlook for rain on the parched agricultural lands and depleted reservoirs and lakes of the Pacific coast appeared more remote than ever today.

Light showers Wednesday in the northern Sacramento valley brought rejoicing to farmers in that region, but joy changed to bitter disap-

pointment when the capricious winds carried the rain clouds into the northwest.

As the rain began to fall in Seattle and Tacoma, both of which cities have suffered serious power failures, cheering crowds appeared on the streets, but merriment was short-lived when it became evident that the showers were of short duration

and were not the predecessors of a deluge.

Efforts of the city of Tacoma to obtain the use of the generating plant of the U. S. S. Lexington continued, as street cars ceased operation save during rush hours. Houses were lighted by kerosene lamps.

Serious industrial shutdowns faced the city, and labor leaders were appealing to Washington to hurry approval of the Lexington plan.

The short lived rains passed over Seattle to Vancouver, B. C., but failed to reach the lakes that supply power for that city.

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No feature that would add to the workmanship or construction of this house has been omitted.

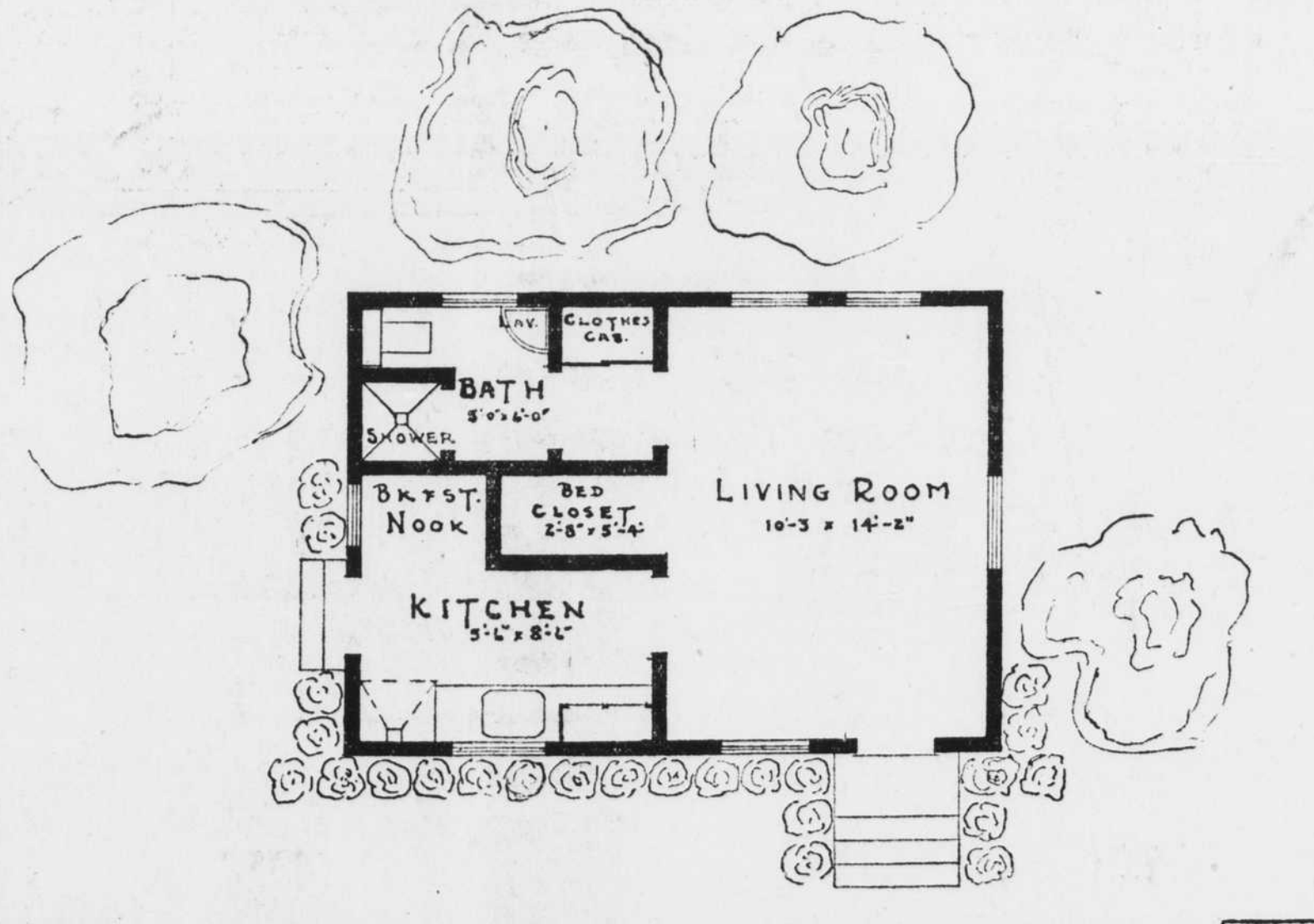
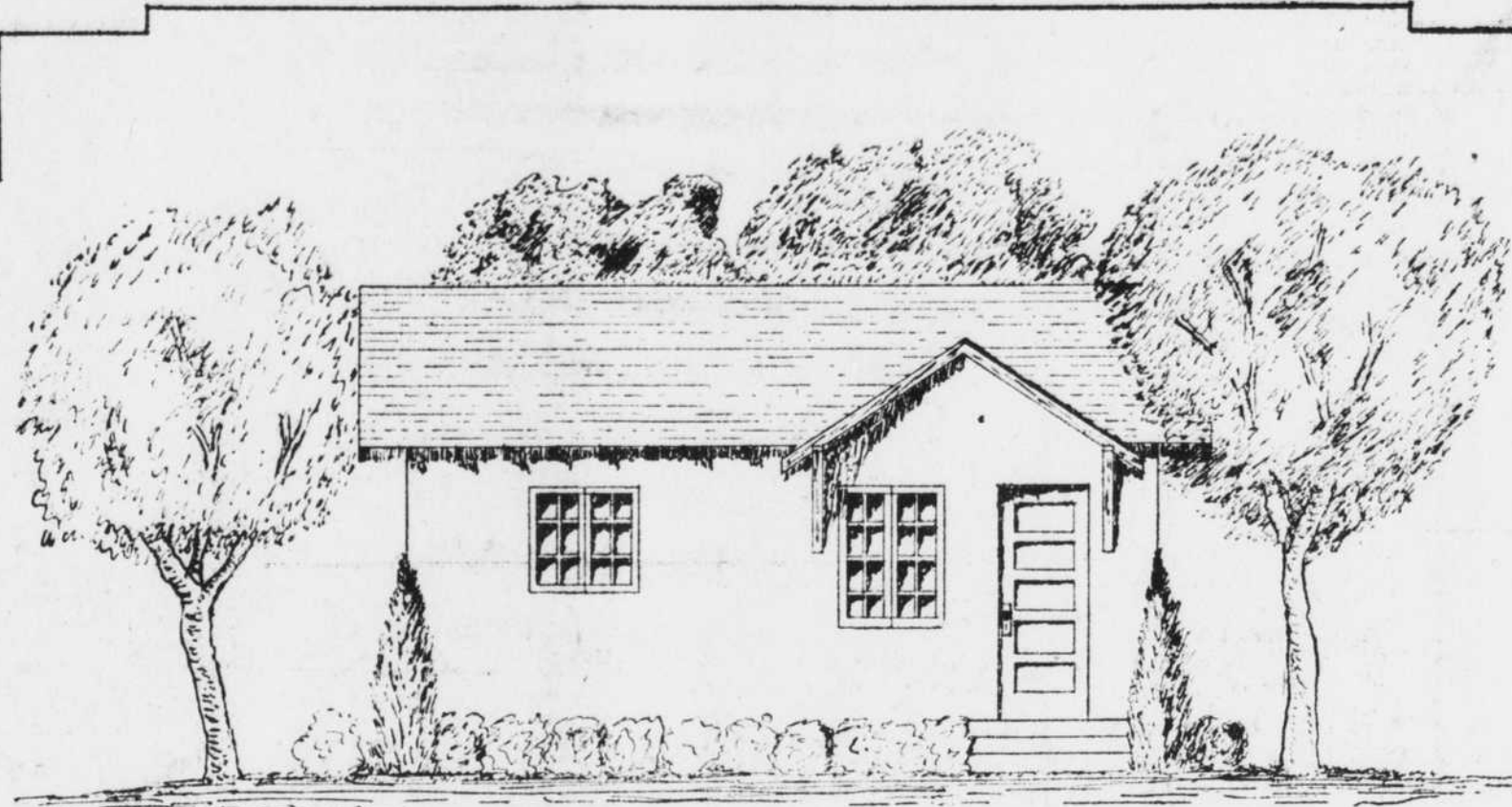
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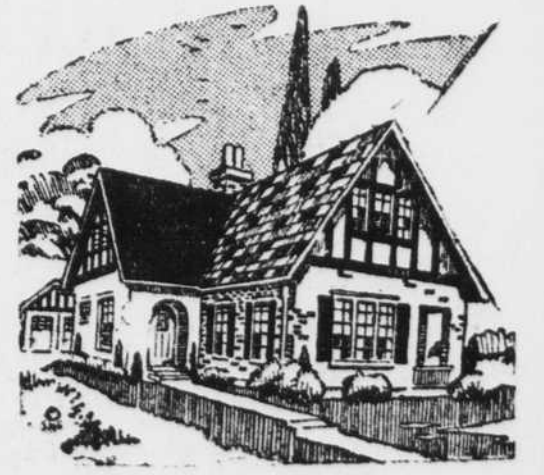
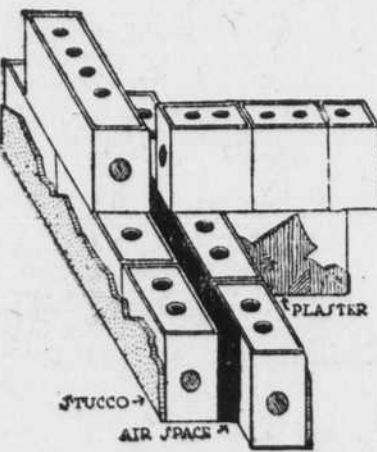
