Dog In Last Stages Killed Yesterday; Police Give Warning; Four Persons Taking Treatment.

Several dogs, one in the final stages of rabies, were killed yesterday by the police department in its war against the dread contagion

Negative returns from Carson City on a dog's head and a cat's head sent recently for analysis showed that the two animals had not been infected with rabies.

Still, however, the contagion is considered enough to be dangercus, according to police, and two adults and two children are known to be taking treatments to fore-11 any possibility of the disease developing as the result of bites sustained by them.






