#### Trade Relations Of Los Angeles, Vegas Will Be Topic at **Chamber Meeting**

Seeking to promote proper trade relations between Las Vegas and Los Angeles, Albert V. Weigel, domestic trade commissioner of the Los Angeles chamber of commerce is in this city, and will address the local chamber of commerce this noon, and the Kiwanians and Rotarians tomorrow and Thursday respectively.

Having recently completed a trade survey of Las Vegas and Los Angeles, Mr. Weigel is recognized as having a message worthy of the careful attention of Las Vegans. His survey will be published in the near future, soon after the first of the year, and about 20,000 of which will distributed, according to present

"Los Angeles people really are interested in the substantial development of Las Vegas," said Mr. Weigel yesterday afternoon, "and the Los Angeles chamber of commerce intends to aid in every possible way the bringing about of this substantial development.

"For," he said, "we of the southwest are interdependent on one another. Los Angeles is perhaps the greatest potential market for Southern Nevada's non-metallics.

'We have spent and are spending great sums to bring people out here from the east. And we are bringing them not alone for Los Angeles. For many of them find their way to the other communities throughout the southwest.

"We have exhibits in Chicago and Washington, D. C., and offices in large population centers throughout, the nation. Then, too, we keep on hand information concerning virtuand other parts of your state.' Weigel expressed the hope that Las Vegas' development from now
