Helping the Homemaker - PINEAPPLE DELIGHT - A PLEASANT DESSERT - Rolled Flank Steak and Baked Potatoes - Escalloped Onions - Muffins - Celery and Apple Salad - Pineapple Delight - Coffee

Roll of Flank Steak, Serving 6 - 1 flank steak - 1 teaspoon salt - 1 teaspoon paprika - 4 tablespoons bacon fat - 1/2 cup water - Wipe off the steak with a damp cloth. Make sharp cuts with a knife across the grain of the meat. Sprinkle with the salt and paprika. Spread with the stuffing and roll up. Tie in place with a white cord. Brown in the bacon fat, which has been heated in a frying pan. Add the water and a lid. Cook for 1 1/2 hours, or until very tender when tested with a fork.

The steak can be cooked on top of the stove or baked in a moderately slow oven. Flank steak is high in nutritive properties, and when cooked slowly and well seasoned it is very palatable and is an economical dish.

STUFFING - 2 cups soft bread crumbs - 2 tablespoons chopped bacon (uncooked) - 1/2 cup water - 1/2 cup onion - 1/2 cup celery salt - 1 egg yolk - 3 tablespoons butter, melted - 2 tablespoons hot water - Mix the ingredients. Spread on the meat.

This dressing is suitable for any sort of meat or fish. Celery and Apple Salad - 2-3 cup diced celery - 1 cup diced apples - 1 tablespoon lemon juice - 1/2 teaspoon salt - 1/2 cup broken nuts - 1-3 cup salad dressing - Chill the ingredients. Combine and serve at once on lettuce.

Tribute to Press of Nation Is Printed in Records of Senate

A tribute to the press of the nation, given by Representative Louis Ludlow, of Indiana, on the occasion of the unveiling of a tablet marking the National Press Building in Washington, D. C., on November 14, was recently ordered entered upon the permanent records of the U. S. Senate by unanimous consent.

Ludlow's remarks were as follows: "I am very grateful for the invitation to say a few words on this occasion. I was honored in the arms of the press, and after a few years—perhaps a very few years—of wandering on Capitol Hill I expect to return to her loving embrace. I know that when I come back she will eschew the paddle and will kiss me on the cheek, and I am happy in the contemplation of an affectionate reunion."

"We are assembled today to erect a tablet at the place which is rightfully entitled to be designated as the home of the press, located at the very apex of the traditional Newspaper Row, which is almost as old and honored as the nation itself; housed in a building that is a perfect architectural cameo, with a setting of incomparable historical richness; across the river from the home of Robert E. Lee, the hero of the Southland, whose sleep the country's heroic dead, and Abraham Lincoln left the portals of earth and became, next to Christ, the greatest triumph of the ages; and only seven squares from the spot where the telegraph, the wireless, the airplane, the radio, and the greatest leaves of intelligence, was born and where the first telegraph message in the history of the world was flashed across the wires."

"Time will not permit a review of the development of newspapers, from the Acta Urbana of the Romans to the extensive news organization and multiple presses that are today among the marvels of human achievement, but it is meet and proper that for the turning we should forget the mechanics of our calling and for a brief moment philosophize on those things that come to mind by virtue of our present surroundings and the situation of this occasion."

"This home of the press is the largest, non-governmental building in our National Capital, and so what it symbolizes—the power of the press—is outside of the government, the most potent institution in America devoted to the rights of man. Without the press government itself in our republic would be unstable and insecure."

"If the press were taken away, how gloomy would be this world of ours! How dark and devious would be the deeds committed! How instantaneously would oppression begin to do its deadly work! Liberty would be murdered. Respect for law would give way to unbridled license. The common man would soon find himself bound by the thongs of tyrants to the chariot wheels of oppression."

"Whether we realize it or not, a free, untrammelled, and courageous press is the hope of the world. Before its white light tyrants skulk and dodge and sink away into ignominious oblivion. It paralyzes the arm that would wrong humanity. It makes politicians walk in the straight and narrow path."

"Experience of 37 years as a newspaper man has convinced me that the security of the nation lies not in the officeholders, who make its laws and administer its affairs, but in the press which keeps watch over the officeholders. Who of us has not witnessed, times without number, the beneficent influence of the press in the local affairs of our cities and communities. When officeholders sell the record with p. m."

Mutual Betting System Proposed - PARIS, Dec. 9. (U.P.)—The French government is considering the extension of the mutual betting system now in operation on Longchamps. A bill and other horse racing courses under government control, to automobile racing.

At present there is no control over motor race betting, with the result that bookmakers often disappear when their losses are heavy, and the government fails to collect the commission from any of the bets.

Since mechanics have replaced horses in general life, the government feels there is just as much interest in promoting good horse-flesh as a portion of the takings from the motor betting races. It is proposed to establish prizes for international races. For the present the mutual system will not be applied to foot races.

ON THE SIDELINES by BRIAN BELL

Two plays in football the same day were just alike but different. In the Cornell-Dartmouth game, Howard Johnson, Cornell back, ran over to take a low, short pass over the line. The speed of the back with a bit better than that of the ball and he had to turn to retrace his steps.

When he turned back toward the line of scrimmage, the Dartmouth players evidently thought the pass had grounded. "Howdy" made a good two-handed catch of the ball and then stood there with it in his hands, strengthening the impression he sought to leave—that it was only an incomplete pass. In the Yale-Princeton game, Dan Hickok rushed over and apparently intercepted a short, underslung Tiger pass. He started for the goal with a full head of steam but when no opposition developed to the dash, he staid, almost stopped, looked back, and then trotted away with the ball under his arm to the goal line, a 60-yard jog. The referee thought it was all right, signalled the touchdown and placed the ball in position for the try for point after touchdown. The referee and Hickok, however, were all along at the goal line. All the other players were grouped about the three other officials near the center of the field. The referee then found that the ball had remained right there and had been caught by Hickok on the bound. It was not a touchdown—only an incomplete pass. Most of the spectators were astonished for from the stands the ball seemed to have been plucked out of the air.

In this same Yale-Princeton game, the referee was knocked to the ground during the progress of a play and remained right there until the play moved on. He was out for a minute or two, but came back to finish under his own power.

This referee was more fortunate than some others have been. An official in another game took a hard tumble and was in a hospital for a few days. A player started running with the ball and the referee ran right beside him. After a short while players on the opposition realized that unintentionally the official was running perfect interference for the man with the ball. Two of the enemy moved in battle formation on official and player. One "cut down" the referee and with the protection out of the way, the other tackled the ball carrier. The referee was shaken up and suffered a sprained knee.

Another referee was not so fast as he thought and when he failed to get out of the way of the play he was buried under a mass of players. He pulled up limping and after one play exchanged places with the field judge.
