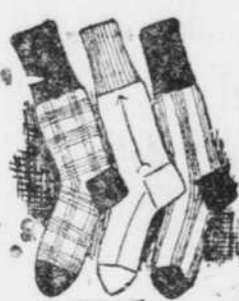

New Fire Truck To Be Here Soon

New Outfit Will Be Brought From L. A. On Own Power; Shipped By Boat from New York.

The city's new fire truck will be in Las Vegas ready for duty within a week, it was prophesied yesterday by Fire Chief Harold Case.

Being shipped to San Pedro by ocean from the American La France plant in Elmira, New York, the truck will be driven from there to Los Angeles, it has been announced.

In Los Angeles it will be subjected to underwriters' test, after which it will be driven to Las Vegas. Case probably will journey to the California metropolis to bring the new outfit to this city, it is believed.

Great Building Activity Booms On South Main

New Stage Garage To Be Finished Soon; Smith Is Pushing Work on Miller's Concrete Building.

South Main street is now the busiest appearing section of Las Vegas, with two new buildings going up a short distance apart.

The new U. P. stage garage is beginning to look like a real building, outside finishings having been started.

The new structure being built by John Miller on the other side of the street near the middle of the block is going up fast, and will add three new store spaces to the city in the near future, according to Contractor Smith.

Corner Lights Are Installed

Two Street Illuminators Are Placed; Nine Others To Be Set Up; Old Fremont Equipment Used.

Installation of lights at First and Carson and at Second and Carson was completed yesterday, according to Harold Case of the local power and telephone company. These lights, which were formerly part of the Fremont system, will add greatly to the city's system, and nine others also will be placed on corners, it is announced.

The other corners, according to Case, are as follows:

- Sixth and Linden, Seventh and Linden, Seventh and Mesquite, Sixth and Stewart, Seventh and Stewart, Eighth and Odden, Eighth and Lewis, Fifth and Garces and the bend just over the railroad track on the main road to West Side.

The light at the intersection of Main and the road to West Side will be moved from its present location where the old road formerly left North Main, to the present intersection.

The lights being installed are the ones which were removed from Fremont street when the new Marbellite system was completed.

A few new goosenecks are being reinstalled on Main and on Fifth, according to Case.

Southern Nevada Unique Country

Tourist, Archaeologist and Geologist Here Find Features of Absorbing Interest, Says Traveler.

Mr. Lawrence Litchfield of Philadelphia, who is traveling through the west on business and pleasure combined, is in Las Vegas for a few days looking over this part of the country. He plans to go to Boulder Dam site today and leaves for Los Angeles this evening.

Mr. Litchfield yesterday visited the northern part of the county and was greatly interested in the unusual features of nature which he observed. In an interview with The Age last evening Mr. Litchfield said:

"In the opinion of one visitor at least, there is no more unique stretch of country to be found anywhere than Southern Nevada. The tourist, the archaeologist and the geologist can here find features of absorbing interest.

"In the Valley of Fire, the natural forces of folding, faulting and erosion, have produced a series of physical features which, not only in color, but also in form, combine to make the name of the Valley a perfect description of it.

"The massive deposits of magnetite in the Muddy River valley are spectacular to say the least. Their genesis is an unsolved problem; their future utilization is a question of purification, transportation and competition from present sources of supply. That they have already been utilized in a small way by a past civilization is assured by the discovery of the remnants of fires and fragments of pottery in the talus material at the base of the deposits.

"The large salt deposits in the same valley have been exploited to a certain extent in recent years; their PAST commercial value ('past' in the sense of thousands of years rather than scores) is attested by the frequent occurrence of some implements—hatchets, hammers and wedges—in the talus material along the foot of the outcrop.

Yes, it'll take a lot of men and a long time to drive a hundred kegs of nails, but that's what Tom Sorenson's general superintendent, Leroy Welling, plans to accomplish in the building of the three new high school buildings here during the next few months.

Nearly a score of men are now at work on the \$300,000 building project, the excavation having been started Thursday and the job expected to be complete about today. An average of forty men, or thereabouts, will be employed on the job most of the time, Mr. Sorenson estimated yesterday.

More than 30,000 feet of lumber have been unloaded from one of the flatcars, and another similar load, received recently from Portland, Ore., will be unloaded soon. The hundred kegs of nails also have arrived.

The surveyor's crew is now working on the survey for the shop and gymnasium.

The entire main building will be built six inches higher than the original specifications called for, according to E. H. Huntington, the school board, so as to provide sufficient headroom for the sewage system. The sewer probably will have to be built all the way to Fremont, it is expected.

Mr. Sorenson plans to leave next Wednesday or Thursday for Salt Lake City, to return here after the holidays. He will keep in touch with the progress of the work from time to time.

Lee Brown, who accompanied him here from Salt Lake City, is in charge of clerical work on the job.

Sub-contractors were let this week for most of the remaining jobs. Contracts for painting and metal lath probably will be let before Mr. Sorenson leaves, he stated yesterday, completing letting of sub-contracts.

It is planned to give the painting contract, in all probability, to a local concern, bids now being awaited by the contractor. The Southern Nevada Lumber company probably will be given the contract for purchase of the metal lath, although this has not yet been definitely determined, according to Sorenson.

K. Woods, Los Angeles, Ore., and Boulder Lumber Co., Las Vegas; plastering, H. A. Shupe, Ogden, Utah; ornamental iron, Cryer Wire and Iron Co., Salt Lake; sheet metal, Carver Sheet Metal Co., Salt Lake.
