FEDERAL BUILDINGS **FUND VOTED**

House Authorizes Use Of Quarter Billion For U. S. Housing Throughout Nation

WASHINGTON, Dec. 16. (A)-In less than two hours and virtually without opposition the house today authorized more than a quarter of billion dollars for government buildings throughout the country. Nearly half of the sum will be expended for federal construction program in the District of Colum-

A like sum would be apportioned for post offices and other federal buildings all over the country. These funds were authorized in a single measure introduced by Chairman Elliott of the public buildings com-

Under two other bills sent to the senate the United States supreme court would receive a new home near the capitol at an expenditure of \$9,740.000, and \$14,000,000 will be devoted to hospital building needs of World war veterans.

"All cities owning sites for new post offices and having annual postal receipts of more than \$10,000 would receive preference in alloting funds made available under the bill," says a United Press dispatch.
