

U. P. A. C. Plans Swimming Pool, Picnic Ground, Basketball Games, Vaudeville, Dance and Band

Basketball games with Hurricane, Utah, and the intermountain champions from Rock Springs, Wyoming, starting of a vaudeville in Las Vegas, construction of a swimming pool and picnic ground and organization of a U. Youth Has Thrill as of Finding Oil Cesspool He's Digging Turns to Flaming Pit May Be Well, We Do Not Know, But—

The thrill of having found a big oil-well, right in Las Vegas' front yard, was felt yesterday by Ed Pizinger, who, from a digger in a mere cesspool under construction, suddenly became discoverer of the fact that there was something which would burn in the pit in which he and his father had been digging.

And not only burn, but continue to burn. Who wouldn't get a thrill out of the discovery that the soil where he had been working was simply reeking with inflammable liquid.

So intense was the excitement occasioned by the flaming pit, which burned for an hour or two, that H. A. Phillipson, local oil man, Dr. Harold, who has been drilling for oil near Eden during the past year, and others were brought to the scene.

One and three tenths miles from the Age office out the Los Angeles highway, on the east side of the road, is a court of tourist cabins, built on land owned by Ed Phillipson.

Phillipson has been in San Bernardino for the past two months, but Ed Pizinger and his father, Frank Pizinger, were digging the cesspool about a hundred feet off the highway.

They were down to a depth of seven or eight feet at 3:30 yesterday afternoon when surface water be-

gan accumulating, and Mr. Pizinger, senior, left the diggings because of the peculiar smell.

His son cast a lighted match into the pit, which immediately flamed up, according to his story, and continued to burn. The fire was extinguished with chemicals and later relighted, as an experiment. It burned cheerfully again, it is said.

About a month or two ago there was a leak in a gasoline pipe in connection with the service station, through which leak a considerable quantity of gasoline was lost before it was repaired, according to young Pizinger.

This might offer an explanation for the oil and gas discovery. This incident recalls to the minds of old timers an oil "discovery" of 1906, down on south Main street, when it was discovered that the source of oil was a leak from which quantities of distillate had escaped from a tank of the Consolidated Power and Telephone company which was buried in the ground near the old power house.

It is agreed, however, that it wouldn't hurt Las Vegas' feelings in the least if the south Fifth street land yielded oil or natural gas.

Experts are cautious about making statements as yet.

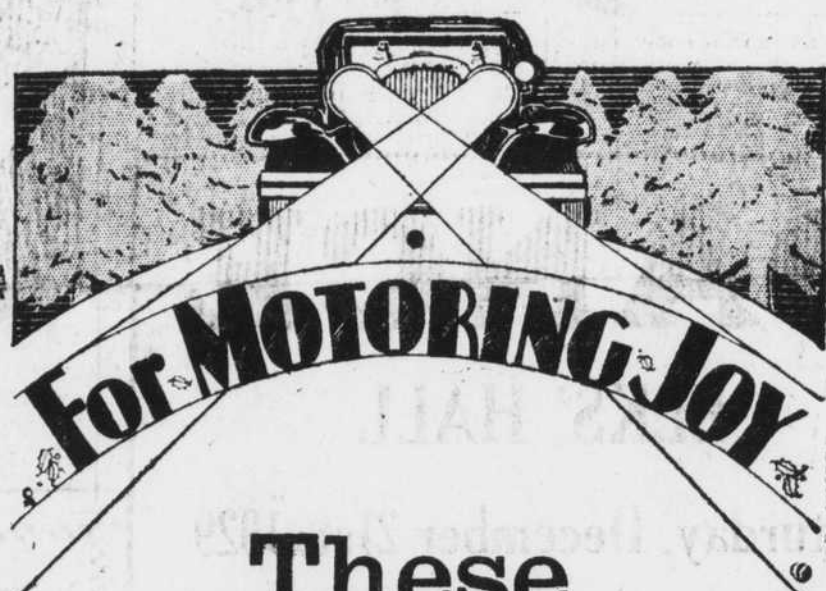
