

Christmas Fruit Cake Are Given

The making of fruit cake for the unusual care if one wishes to avoid

the Bureau of Home Economics of the United States Department of very carefully, wash it, and dry it. The other members of the cast Cut citron or other dried peel into small pieces. Make sure there are not bits of shell among the nuts and that they are all sweet and

In mixing start as with any cake by creaming the butter and sugar. adding the beaten yolks of the eggs and the liquid. Cider or grape juice tart jelly, and often sour cream and molasses are used for the liquids Jelly that is not firm enough for the table but otherwise of good flavor may be put in the cake. The molasses should be sweet, not strong. Half of the flour is mixed with the leavening and spices, and half with the fruits and nuts to keep them evenly distributed throughout the dough. Add the first part of the flour alternately with the liquid. then the floured fruits and nuts Use the hand to mix well. Add the

Test the fruit cake with a clean straw. Turn it out on a rack to cool as soon it is done. When cool, wrap in waxed or parchment paper and put away in a tight tin box. If this is done the cake will keep for many weeks. It should be looked at once in a while to make sure that no mold is starting. Some people prevent fruit cake from drying out by putting half an apple in the tin with it or a piece of cheesecloth dampened with cider.
