'Lunar' Rocket Poised For Trip Far In Heavens

Camp Devens Is Scene of Closely Guarded Plans for Experiment; Scientist Has Hope of Flight Soon.

AYER, Mass., Dec. 24 (UP)—The big brother of the sky rocket with which you used to celebrate Fourth of July is poised here for one of the most extraordinary flights in history.

Some time in the not far distant future, if all goes well, this 12-foot steel projectile will rise with incredible speed from a tower at Camp Devens on the outskirts of this quiet little town and nose its way skyward, seeking the secrets of altitudes never reached by a man-made device.

The rocket's noisy zoom into space will mark the latest step in a series of unusual experiments started 20 years ago by Dr. Herbert H. Goddard, Clark university scientist.

Popular fancy has drawn a seemingly indelible halo of romance around Professor Goddard's rocket during the years that he has busied himself with his work in the rather prosaic atmosphere of a laboratory.

To Record Air Data
Even his insistent declarations that he has no lunar aspirations have failed to destroy the general belief that he hopes eventually to send his strange contraption to the moon.

Those who toy most frequently with this fascinating theory like to think that there will be a man inside the huge steel tube as it speeds over the 220,000 or more miles to its fanciful destination. No one appears to have given much thought to the rather knotty problem of how the man would get back to earth, once he had completed his journey.

But professor Goddard protests that the paramount object of his experimentation at present is to obtain accurate data on meteorological conditions at various altitudes.

His big rocket is equipped with numerous devices for recording such information—devices which are intended to return to earth with the aid of a parachute attachment.

Test Rocket Noisy
Dr. Goddard has kept secret the exact method by which his projectile is propelled. It is understood, however, that the general idea is for a series of timed explosions to speed the rocket on its way, with a fresh blast expediting its flight as the power afforded by the previous explosion begins to wane.

At Auburn, near Worcester, several months ago, Dr. Goddard shot a rocket skyward. The scientist appeared well-pleased with the outcome of the test, light but the attendant explosions alarmed residents of the countryside.

It was suggested by the fearful that recording devices carried by the rocket, in returning to earth, might smite a native. Dr. Goddard argued that the object which returned to the ground invariably landed only a short distance from the point from which the rocket had been loosed. Finally he compromised by transferring his experimental station to Camp Devens.

Mystery has surrounded the professor's activities hereabouts. That remote sections of deserted Camp Devens from which his 80-foot steel "rocket" poles its nose into the air are guarded by two of his representatives who thus far have barred all curious from the reservation.

NICE, France, Dec. 25 (UP)—The greatest gambling Christmas Eve in history was reported today from Nice, Cannes and Monte Carlo. The casinos remained open all night, and croupiers worked in relays. It was estimated 27,000,000 francs were staked in the play.

Den Eielson, noted Alaskan flyer, who has been lost in the vicinity of Cape North.

The society is sending its offer into northwestern Siberia, hoping it will result in the organization of searching parties in the northern desert regions where it is possible Eielson may have landed.

A twin-motored plane probably will be sent into the region soon in an effort to locate the missing aviators, who left Alaska several weeks ago on a rescue mission.

Six days have passed since the government instructed its steamer Stavropol to send dog teams in search of them. The Stavropol is ice-bound in the Arctic near the fur ship Nanook, to which Eielson was flying when he disappeared. No word had come from the Soviet vessel, presumably because of the difficulties in radio transmission.

Woman, Nephew, Doctor Slain; Death Mystery

Negro Employee Is Sought After Three Bodies Are Found; Blood-stained Axe Found Near Scene.

KNOXVILLE, Tenn., Dec. 25 (AP)—The motive for the slaying of Dr. Barclay Jones, 61, mystified different officials investigating killings since the discovery of three bodies today.

All had been beaten to death. The coroner's jury this afternoon returned a verdict of murder by unknown, with robbery as the motive.

Sheriff Walker Anderson and his son, deputy sheriff, announced the belief that the slayings had followed an attack on Mrs. Jones, and said they are seeking a young negro named Sam who had been employed in the household for the past week.

Sam, the sheriff said, made his home in the basement where Mrs. Jones' stripped body was found with that of her nephew.

Nearby the body of Dr. Jones, prominent physician, was found on the floor of the garage.

A bloodstained axe and a pair of hedge clippers were found nearby.

Farmer Insane, Kills Family

WALNUT COVE, N. C., Dec. 25 (AP)—The body of C. D. Larson, forty-three, father and husband, was found today about half a mile from his home with a shotgun wound in his chest.

At home the bodies of Mrs. Larson, thirty-eight, Marie, seventeen, James, seven, Raymond, five, and Mary Lou, four, were found.

The mother and oldest daughter were shot in the chests, apparently by the same gun used by the father to end his own life.

James, Raymond and Mary Lou were beaten to death with a blunt instrument.

In a tobacco barn a quarter of a mile away, neighbors found the bodies of Carrie, fourteen, and Marielle, ten. They were shot in the backs, apparently while fleeing from the father.
