CHICKEN PIE FROM LEFTOVERS

Chicken Pie Spiced Peaches
Bread Currant Jelly
Head Lettuce Russian Dressing
Pineapple Pudding Coffee

2 cups flour
4 teaspoons baking powder
1/4 teaspoon salt
4 tablespoons fat
1 egg
1/2 cup milk

Mix the flour, baking powder and salt. Cut in the fat with a knife. Mix with the knife, add the egg and milk. Pat out the dough on a floured paper. Roll or pat out until the dough is 2-3 inch thick. Cut out with a biscuit cutter two inches in diameter. Place the biscuit side by side on top the chicken mixture

4 tablespoons butter or chicken fat
4 tablespoons flour
2 cups milk or chicken stock
1/2 cup gravy
1 1/2 cups diced cooked chicken
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup diced, cooked celery
1 cup diced, cooked carrots
1 tablespoon chopped onions, cooked
1/2 teaspoon pepper

Melt the butter and add the flour. Blend well and add the milk and cook until a creamy sauce forms. Add the rest of the ingredients and pour into a buttered shallow pan. Cover with the biscuit mixture.

1 cup fat (half butter)
2 cups sugar
1/2 cup milk

4 cups flour
1 cup white raisins

1 cup chopped candied orange peel
1 cup shredded almonds
1 cup coconut
9 egg whites, stiffly beaten

ON THE SIDELINES by BRIAN BELL



Major R. R. Neyland, Army engineer officer, former star football, baseball player and boxer at West Point and for four years head football coach at the University of Tennessee, sat in his little chubby hole of an office on the campus of the Knoxville institution and talked football.

"You wouldn't believe me if I told you how good Southern football really is," he said when he was asked if Southern teams play a high class game.

The tall, dark officer, with a twinkle so far back in his rugged features that one has to look closely to be sure that it is there, was about to close his third season at Tennessee without a defeat. A few hours after the conversation he saw his Volunteers, led by the three foot ball muffers, Gene McEver, Budgy Hackman and Bobby Dodd, splash through the mud to an impressive 54 to 0 victory over the University of South Carolina.

This triumph made Tennessee's record for the three seasons 28 victories and three ties. Two of the dead heats were run with Kentucky and the third with Vanderbilt. The last time Tennessee lost a football game was November 13, 1926, when Vanderbilt won 20 to 3.

The major went to New York to see the thrilling 7 to 0 victory of Notre Dame over Army. He was not impressed.

"Of course the Army and Notre Dame are good football teams," he said. "But at least six teams in the South would have been able to stop either of them that day.

"Southern teams have not made such impressive records in the inter-sectional games for several reasons. Sometimes they get stage fright. An average or even small crowd for a game in the East or Middle West would be a record gathering for our smaller stands."

Major Neyland will not soon forget the 6 to 6 tie his Volunteers played with the University of Kentucky Wildcats at Lexington. In the snowing snow. The field became covered, and when it was necessary to measure the ball's progress to see if a first down had been made the officials had to dig thru the snow to locate the lines.

When Tennessee drove down the Kentucky goal line, the major thought his lads had scored and he rushed in Charley Kohlhase, his dead spot dropkicker, to make the extra point. When the snow was removed it was found that the ball was not over the goal line, and as this development changed the situation the sure footed boy had to help push the ball over, since the game was about over. Having been in the game officially, although he did not take part in a play, the kicker was not available when the touchdown was made a few seconds later. The extra point was missed and the perfect record of victory for the season was marred.

Tennessee closed its season, playing in mud ankle deep. This, however, was no novelty. The Volunteers are the mud horses of the conference. Six of their ten games were played in rain, snow or on heavy tracks.

Federal Judge Scores Prohibition Home Entry

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 25. (U.P.)—Entrance of private homes by prohibition officers searching for liquor without search warrants is one of the most serious evils of prohibition and should be abolished, according to Federal Judge Paul J. McCormick, back in Los Angeles after four months' service in the east with President Hoover's law enforcement committee.

"A man's home is his castle," Judge McCormick said, "and prohibition agents should not enter without recourse to legal procedure."

Judge McCormick said the investigation of law violations was being carried out by the President's commission with absolute impartiality.

"The commission was created primarily to study the problems arising from prohibition but other matters also are under consideration," the jurist said. He added, however, that prohibition and the public attitude toward it constitute the outstanding problems.

Judge McCormick, who was transferred from Los Angeles to a federal bench in New York in order that he might sit with the Hoover commission, said it was possible a report will be made in the spring.

PITTSBURGH, Dec. 27. (U.P.)—Edward Delish, 17, and Richard Prendergast, 18, were arraigned in Morals court here recently charged with chopping down two cherry trees on private property near their homes.

NEW YORKER AT LARGE

NEW YORK—The inauguration of many new extra fare trains on the two principal railway lines between New York and Chicago has not enhanced the traveler's chances of profit.

The passenger on such a train gets a dollar back for every hour his train is late, but only about once in four months is such a refund necessary. Not one train in a hundred runs late, and when it does the almost invariable cause is a wreck ahead or a bad storm.

The fare between New York and Chicago, whatever the route, is \$32.70 on a 28-hour train. The extra fare ranges upward in proportion to the speed of the trains, and in the case of the Twentieth Century and the Broadway Limited, both 20-hour trains, the surcharge is \$9.60.

The extra fare train is developed to its highest point, of course, between New York and Chicago. West of Chicago there is only one such train, and it saves the passenger only five hours to San Francisco. A business man or a movie star, in a hurry, takes a plane. As for the rest—what's five hours to somebody who's going to California to spend the winter?

Airplane Barrier
That reminds us that the fastest way to get to Chicago is to go by train, for there isn't a single passenger air line thither from New York.

One may go almost anywhere else between cities by plane nowadays, but not between the nation's two largest cities.

The Alleghenies are the reason why. The mountain range which lies between New York and Chicago is the graveyard of aviators. Storms and fogs make daily passenger schedules almost impossible to adhere to and dangerous to carry out. Traveling over the Rockies is much easier, flyers say, and generally pleasant.

Professional Pride
This is the season of Santa Claus in department stores, and most of them are paunchy actors out of work.

One Jolly St. Nick employed in a Fifth avenue department store this season was a well known character actor a few years ago.

Some of his friends wondered what had become of him. The other day he sent an ink-scratched note to a dramatic critic: "Mr. J—F—," it said, "who was Santa Claus last year at the L— department store, is serving C— Brothers this year in the same capacity."

Manhattan's Caves
New York's transit captains are always mislaying their subway tunnels. Before the war a tube was pierced beneath the East river. It lay idle for years. Finally it was decided to lay tracks through it. A pair of men in hip boots waded through the water that had seeped into it and found that all it needed was pumping out. Now it is part of the Interborough system.

The other day somebody remembered that under Lexington avenue there is a subway tube five blocks long, dug in 1912 and never used. It is one of half a dozen man-made worm-holes beneath New York at which excavators may wonder when, in some future day, they dig up the ruins of Manhattan.
