Judas No Betrayer States Authority

REYNOLDS PACKARD, United Press Staff Correspondent, PARIS, Dec. 30.—Judas Iscariot did not betray Christ for 30 pieces of silver as it is recorded in the New Testament but instead tried by daring strategy to have Jesus crowned king of the Jews, according to H. E. Von Hallinowski, noted German authority of the Bible.

Dr. Kallinowski declares in his latest book, "Judas Iscariot," that this disciple is the most misunderstood man in history. He contends that Judas was not an avaricious man and never manifested any lust for riches and because of his honorable character was made treasurer of the disciples.

Emphasizing the ardor and enthusiasm of the betrayer for the cause of Jesus, Dr. Kallinowski says that Judas was not a Master over 13 and the Roman authorities only in the hope that Christ would perform a miracle and be proclaimed king of the Jews. If he had not been sincere in this enterprise Judas would not have committed suicide by hanging as soon as Christ was crucified, it is reasoned by the German theologian.

This book, which has just made its appearance in Paris, places special stress on the zeal of Iscariot, saying that he worked with as much sacrifice for Christ as the other disciples. It characterizes the story of the "thirty pieces of silver" which are estimated to be equivalent to about \$80, as being inexact.

The intelligence of Judas also comes in for praise on the part of Dr. Kallinowski. He points out that there is little likelihood that a man who had been treasurer and used to handling money would suddenly desert the cause for which he had been fighting and betray his Master for only \$80.

Enforcement Officer Is Shot By Rancher

NAPA, Calif., Dec. 30. (U.P.)—Robert Freeman, a federal prohibition officer at a local hospital today enforcement officer was in a critical with bullet wounds said to have been inflicted by a Yountsville rancher who resisted the agent's search of his home for liquor.

Mr. and Mrs. John South, the rancher and his wife, were in custody today, charged with assault with a deadly weapon, while federal and local authorities conducted a joint investigation of the shooting.

The events leading up to the wounding of Freeman were described by Henry W. Jones, another federal agent, who, armed with a search warrant, accompanied Freeman to the South ranch.

South, according to Jones, drew a revolver when Freeman attempted him from smashing several bottles in the kitchen.

While Jones and Freeman were struggling with South, Mrs. South entered with a shotgun. Several shots were fired from both weapons during the melee, and Freeman fell, with revolver bullets in his breast and arm.

Jones disarmed South and his wife, and took his wounded companion to a Napa hospital. Sheriff John P. Steckner then placed the Souths under arrest.

1930 U. S. CENSUS WILL SHOW 122,000,000 CHIEF PREDICTS

WASHINGTON, Dec. 30. (U.P.)—The 1930 census will show a population of the United States to be approximately 122,000,000, an increase of more than 5,000,000, Leone Truesdell, chief statistician of the census bureau, predicted today. Looking even farther ahead, Dr. L. I. Dublin of the Metropolitan Life Insurance company predicted that by 1950 the population will be stationary at 150,000,000. The birth and death rates then will have become balanced, he said.
