PASADENA, Calif., Dec. 30. (U.P.)—Southern California went out of its way to be hospitable today as the Pitt Panther, rated as the Far East's greatest football team, arrived here for its meeting with Southern California in the annual Tournament of Roses New Year's day game.

Just to make everything as home-like as possible for the Smoky City athletes there wasn't a ray of sunshine breaking through as they descended the train which carried them across the country from Pittsburgh.

The weather bureau announced that this was only the second time since July that clouds obscured the sun. The temperature was lower at 60 degrees than it has been for months.

The forecaster took some of the joy out of the easterners by stating that the clouds soon would pass and that fair and warm weather will prevail when the Panthers go against the Trojans before 70,000 people in the Rose Bowl. Just as the sun once in a while breaks through Pittsburgh's smoke and fog screen, the weather bureau said it would manage to show at least for a little while later today.

Pitt's players, apparently in prime condition, went directly from their train to the Hotel Huntington where they will be quartered during their stay here.

Sutherland announced that a practice was to be held sometime today, probably in Rose Bowl. Another light session will be held tomorrow, he said.

White Pitt was working out in Rose Bowl. Howard Jones intended to put Southern California through a brief workout at Bovard field. Tomorrow the Trojans will practice at Rose Bowl.

Famed Pilot to Hunt Aviators

MOSCOW, Dec. 30. (U.P.)—Boris Shuknovsky, the Russian aviator who gained world-wide fame when he rescued several members of the dirigible Italia's crew, will leave Moscow Tuesday to take charge of the search for Captain Carl Eielson and Earl Borland, American aviators, missing since November 9. Shuknovsky will go to Krasnoyarsk by train, flying from that point for Yakutsk, where the search will begin. The lost aviators are believed to be somewhere between Alaska and Siberia.

Simultaneously, two junker planes at Providence bay will begin a search toward Kolumchinsky bay, from the other side.

A radio message from Captain Milovtsov, the Russian steamer Stavropol stated that natives had seen a plane west of Kolumchinsky bay, toward Cape North, on December 9. Dog teams have been ordered out for a search.

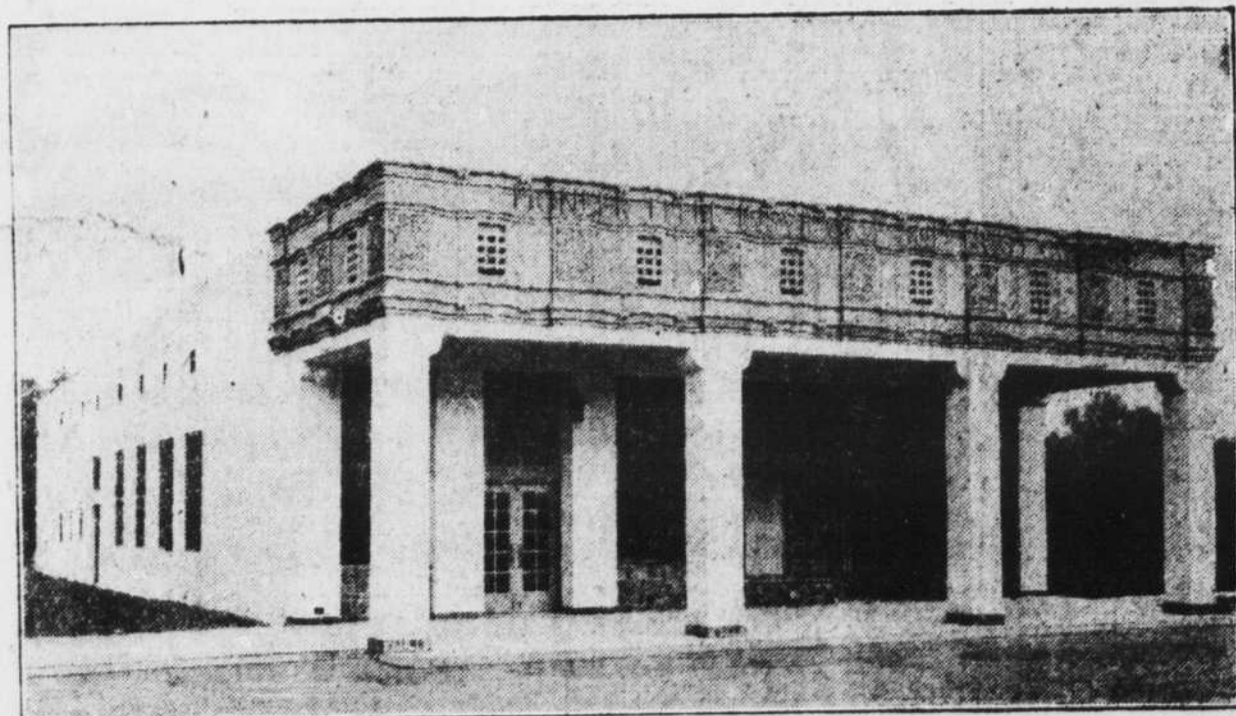
