'Alcotate' Gives Gasoline Flavor To Cocktail, It's New Denaturant For Industrial Alcohol

WASHINGTON, Jan. 2 (AP)—Boozing cocktails—if made from industrial alcohol—are likely to have an unpleasant taste resembling gasoline after January 1. The gasoline-like flavor will be supplied by alcotate, the government's new denaturant, which is a petroleum product more like gasoline than anything else, says G. F. Beyer, chief chemist of the treasury department.

Alcotate has such a repulsive taste and smell, and clings so persistently to alcohol with which it is mixed, that it will discourage bootleggers from diverting industrial alcohol for making illicit liquor, predicts Commissioner James M. Doran of the industrial alcohol bureau.

The new denaturant, a by-product of the refining of gasoline, formerly was thrown out as waste. It was adopted as a denaturant after hundreds of substances had been tested in efforts to find a substitute for deadly wood alcohol.

Drinking alcotate will have practically the same effect as drinking gasoline, Beyer says. It will nauseate the drinker but otherwise will be harmless.

Alcotate looks like light lubricating oil. In concentrated form it has a light yellowish tinge but becomes colorless when mixed with alcohol in the regulation proportion.

The odor from a bottle of alcotate resembles that from inside a dirty gasoline tank, but is stronger and more unpleasant.

Like gasoline, alcotate is highly volatile. That is why bootleggers cannot remove it by redistilling the alcohol.

The earth's mass is roughly six sextillion tons. Dr. Paul Heyl, physicist of the bureau of standards, has measured the constant of gravitation, by which he says the "pull" can be measured more accurately than before.

He has announced it can be expressed by the fraction 6.670 over 100,000,000. This carries the value one decimal place farther than the

value accepted since 1901. Dr. Heyl obtained his value for the gravitation constant after seven years of measuring just how much two 125-pound steel cylinders attracted two two-ounce gold, platinum or glass balls.

The force of this attraction was about equal to the weight of the ink in the period at the end of this sentence, yet Dr. Heyl says he has measured it with an accuracy of 1-30th of one per cent.

His apparatus was set up in a chamber 35 feet under ground to avoid temperature changes and disturbances of the surface.

Dr. Heyl obtained his final result by averaging the various distances the balls swung toward the steel in a series of experiments over the seven-year period.

1,500 Inmates Of San Quentin Pursue Studies

BERKELEY, Calif., Jan. 2 (AP)—There's little to the social side of "university life" at San Quentin prison, but much is being accomplished in class work on the "stone walled campus."

Nearly 1,500 separate courses are being given to as many prisoners by the extension department of the University of California at a total cost of more than \$10,500 yearly without expense to the confined students. No other prison in the world is believed to have as many inmates pursuing an education.

School Spirit Good A good school spirit, while not of the stadium-building type, is reflected in the work accomplished, says Prof. G. A. Smithson, extension director.

Certificates given for courses completed do not intimate that the recipient has ever been in prison, and credits bestowed are good for matriculation into the university.

Language courses are the most popular, with Spanish leading. Mathematics and economics are next. For some time after one of the year's best sellers had been authorized in San Quentin there was a veritable deluge of enrollment in writing courses.

Writing Loses Popularity There had long been a prison rule against writing for outside publications, but this book was smuggled out. It met with instantaneous success, but the prison management was adamant in its refusal to lift the rule, and enthusiasm for writing has waned somewhat.

Most of the instruction is by correspondence but occasionally teachers or lecturers visit the prison.
