Germany always sent a band of young spies over Europe, school boys and girls apparently on a holiday and carrying cameras. When the war broke out, Germany had all the photographs the staff colleges had taken for her own purposes. Since the war all foreigners have been guarded and with rigid control. News articles by all governments have been curtailed. But the French and courts have had great success in catching foreign "spies" in the pay of foreign governments.

Deserters Were Spies It often was easy during the war to obtain traitor spies for a deserter did not dare to return to his regiment, or to his home, for fear of being shot. Germany then offered him a salary and an easy task and used him until he was caught. But in peace time, direct advertisement methods were tried. It was not unusual to pick up a paper anywhere in Europe and read mysterious classified ads like this: Seeking serious collaborator; 100 to 500 fr. monthly. Write B. P. 46, Brussels. During the summer vacations, Saturday: England's spy system.

Germany's Espionage System The espionage system perfected by Germany in pre-war days was a model of efficiency. Austria, Hungary, France, Belgium, Russia, were just so many classifications in a card index that was an epitome of the intimate details of Europe's military organizations.

German Efficiency The thoroughness of German spy methods was well exemplified when, on the opening day of war in 1914, the French general staff found itself without modern maps of the frontier regions. The German general staff, on the contrary, had a complete map of France, every turn in the road, every cross road and hill-ock.

For 40 years before the war, a German of Leipzig named Karl Baedeker had made the guide books for France. He did it so well that all his French competitors withdrew from the field. Baedeker had sent his engineers all over France until they had made an accurate map of every inch of French soil. It was no trouble at all for the German staff to send to Leipzig and obtain the originals which had been checked for accuracy only a few weeks before the war broke out.

Oklahoma City Oil Field Roars Into Third Year

OKLAHOMA CITY, Jan. 12. (AP)—The wild Oklahoma City oil field is starting its third year—but it's only a "baby" yet. It might be just the all, the Oklahoma City field doesn't know its own strength. Experts who work atop its mile-deep cavern of "crude," say the field can give the world 3,000,000 barrels of oil daily.

Output Is Held Down While the great petroleum reserve on the doorstep of a city of 200,000 has a greater daily capacity than the actual present output of the whole United States, its wells are flowing approximately 2 1/2 per cent of what they can do—literally four hours out of every 12 days. This is the result of a proration agreement.

The pool's millionaires are only "potential" because their recovery to date—about 32,000,000 barrels—has brought them but \$41,600,000, while he outlay in putting down 151 oil producers, 24 gas wells, 128 drilling wells and 15 dry holes has been approximately \$143,150,000.
