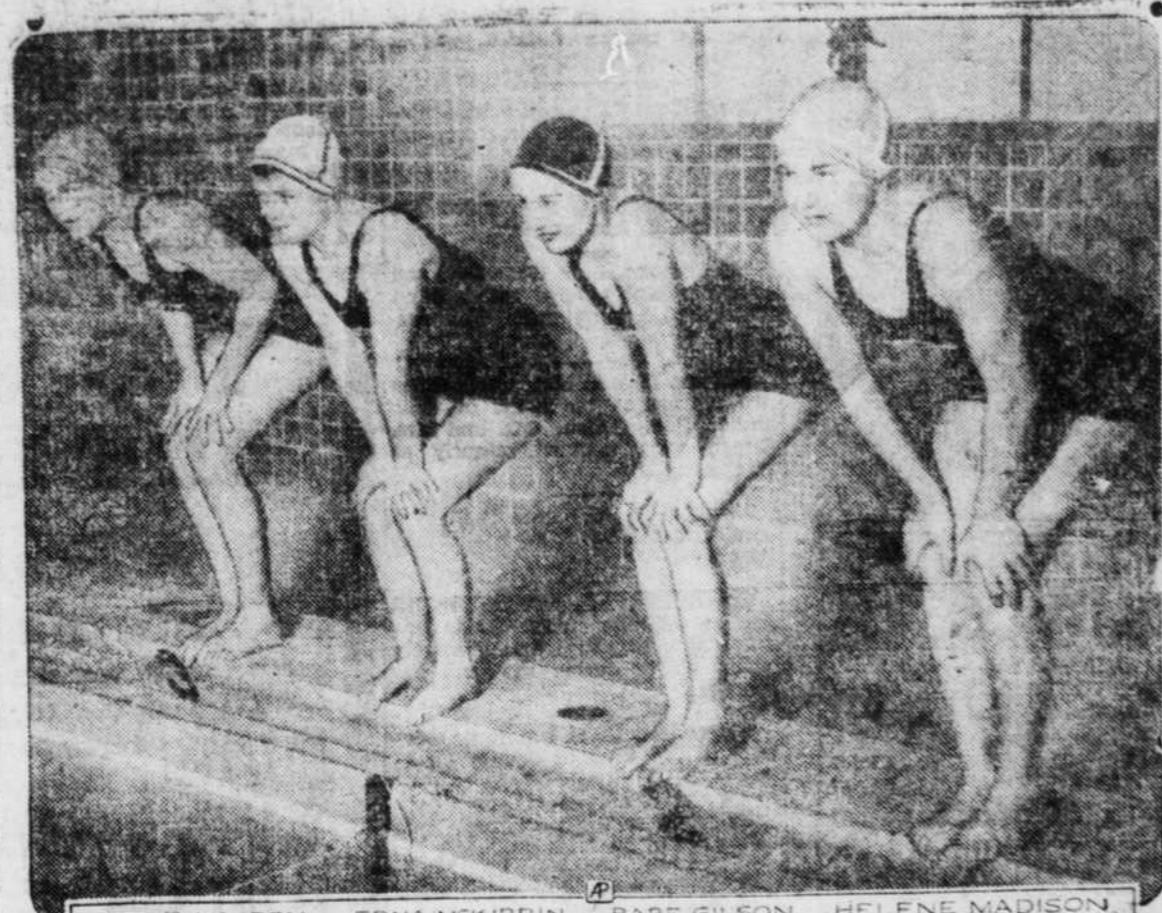
Mr. and Mrs. Potthoff will live at 720 South Second street until Boulder City is completed.

## Seattle Girls Under 400-Yard Relay Record In Practice For Indoor Swim Championship

The recognized American mark for the 400 yard relay already is at the mercy of four Seattle girls training at the Washington Athletic club for the Women's National Indoor Swimming championships to be held in New York in March.

SEATTLE, Jan. 16. (AP)—Led by the parable Helene Madison, world's greatest woman swimmer, four Seattle girls will invade New York next March for the Women's National Indoor Swimming championship and they figure to establish a new 400-yard relay record.

Racing below the present recognized American mark of 4 minutes 23 4-5 seconds in practice the Seattle team, greatly assisted by the sensational Helene who is clicking off 100 yards in an even 60 seconds, expects to better the unofficial record of 4:19 2-4 made last year at Miami by the New York Women's association quartet.

The Seattle girls — Bebe Gilson, Edna McKibbin, Olive McKee and Miss Madison who virtually rewrote the whole women's record book last season when she established 12 world's marks and 26 new American figures—already have reached four minutes and 20 seconds. The girls are racing for the new Washington Athletic club.

Ray Daughters, coach of the W. A. C. team and the man who made

Helene the greatest woman swimmer of all time, believes that his quartet can do 4:18 by March.

Daughters also figures that his girls may be able to capture the team championship. He plans to enter Miss Madison in the 100, 200 and 500 yard events and she is considered a cinch for first place in each for a total of 15 points. The 400-yard relay would give the Seattle girls another 10 points should they win it.

Helene also will enter the 100-yard backstroke and is being counted upon for either a first or second place. The other three girls will compete in free style events and may pick up a few more points.

Individually the girls have done better than the unofficial mark of 4:19 2-5 in the 400-yard relay but not as a team.

Miss Gilson has covered 100 yards in 1:05. Miss McKibbin has done 1:06 and Miss McKee has turned in 1:07. These times added to Helene's 60 seconds total 4:18.

The present American record was set by Gertrude Edsall, Alleen Risgin, Adelaide Lambert and Helen Wainwright, of the New York Wo-

### Lost Articles Of Americans Swamp French

PARIS, Jan. 16. (AP)—One million francs was the sum paid out in rewards in 1930 for recovery of nearly 200,000 articles lost in Paris, many of them the property of American tourists.

The authorities say that Americans, on vacation, lose their belongings with astonishing facility and that they pay the biggest rewards.

A packet of diamonds worth millions of francs, thousands of umbrellas, the manuscript of a novel on Paris written in England, lawyers' brief cases, wagon-loads of hand-bags, diplomatic documents—these were a few of the widely assorted objects lost and found.

The exact total of articles found was 180,000, but there was other property of negligible value which was not docketed. To store the huge mass of stuff, the police had to extend their premises at the Surete-Generale.

The police say that people are far more absent-minded now than 20 years ago. In 1910, for instance, the total number of objects found was 85,000.

This absent-mindedness is not peculiar in Paris, say the authorities, for the same state of affairs exists in all the big capitals of the world.

### Press Praises Chilean's Work

LONDON, Jan. 16. (AP)—His Excellency Enrique Villegas, Chile's ambassador to the Court of St. James, has been praised for his important work in the League of Nations Council by the British press.

It has often been charged, the local press states, that representatives from Latin-America have been unwilling to do their share of work. At times it has been said that Latin-American delegates are aloof and over-zealous in the arts of canvassing which ultimately results in a large allowance of honorific posts.

Speaking of these charges the British press sums them up as untrue and without any basic proof.

The Times, discussing rumored Latin-American aloofness and desire to gain individual honors, in stirring comment said: "Such men as Senor Villegas, the present ambassador to Chile in London, have been rapporteurs for some of the most delicate and important disputes that have come before the League, and others would probably be very pleased if more work were entrusted to them."
