#### RECLAMATION BUREAU TO HASTEN CONSTRUCTION OF BOULDER DAM CAMP CITY

Contracts For Various Features to Be Awarded in Near Future-Plans to House Several Thousand Employes

WASHINGTON, Jan. 19. (49)—The FARM BOARD reclamation bureau is speeding up all along the line to build a model city for the hundreds of workers who will help construct the great \$71,000,000 Hoover dam.

Bids have just been asked for storage tanks and pumps for the Boulder City water system. Bids will be requested soon for material to construct a water distribution sys-

The city, which is expected to house from 3,000 to 4,000 employes of the government and the contractors at work on the Boulder canyon project, will cost about 2,000,000. Plans are being rushed for cottages and the bureau expects most of the available "on easy terms" to any city to be ready for occupancy before the year ends. It will be built
