Helping the Home Maker

A WINTER PARTY MENU Chicken Salad, Nut Bread Sandwiches, Assorted Cookies, Coffee

Chicken Salad, Serving 12 4 cups diced, cooked chicken 4 cups diced celery 1 1/2 teaspoons salt 1-3 teaspoon paprika 3 tablespoons chopped mayonnaise 1 cup stiff mayonnaise 1/2 cup whipped cream

Mix the cream and mayonnaise. Chill. When ready to serve, combine half the mayonnaise mixture with the chicken mixture. Serve on crisp lettuce and top with remaining mayonnaise mixture.

Nut Bread (Two Loaves) 3 cups Graham flour 3 cups flour 6 teaspoons baking powder 1 1/2 cups sugar 1 1/2 cups nuts 3 1/2 cups milk

Mix all ingredients. Pour into two greased loaf pans. Let stand for 15 minutes and then bake 50 minutes in slow oven.

When sandwiches are to be made the bread should be at least twelve hours old. Soft butter or cream cheese can be used as a filling for these sandwiches.

Peanut Drop Cookies (Delicious with hot beverages) 2-3 cup fat 1 1/2 cups light brown sugar 2 eggs 3 tablespoons cream 1 teaspoon vanilla 1/2 teaspoon salt 2-3 cup shelled, roasted peanuts 3 cups flour 1 teaspoon baking powder

Cream the fat and sugar. Add rest of ingredients and drop portions from the end of a spoon onto greased baking sheets. Flatten and bake 12 minutes in moderate oven.

To remove grass stains from wash clothes, spread molasses over the stain and let stand a little while. Rub well between the hands and wash out in the usual way and the stains will come out.

To remove tea or coffee stains from linens, rub the spots with glycerine and let stand 15 minutes and then wash out in warm soap suds.

Lead and Zinc

Show Gain In 1930 Production

The value of gold, silver, copper, lead and zinc in Nevada decreased from \$73,030,237 in 1929 to about \$17,531,800 in 1930, according to a preliminary statement prepared by Victor C. Helges of the United States bureau of mines, department of commerce. Compared with 1929 production there were decreases in the output of all metals except lead and zinc, says the Nevada Mining Press, which gives the following summation of work over the state in the various metals.

Output of lead increased from 19,692,568 pounds in 1929 to about 23,507,000 in 1930, but the value dropped from \$1,240,632 to about \$1,222,400. The Combined Metals at Pioche was the leading producer of lead, followed by the Treadwell Yukon's Tybo property in Nye county, and the Bristol Silver mines in Lincoln county.

Other large producers were the Panther near Montello; the Yellow Pine mine at Goodsprings; the Richmond-Eureka mine at Eureka, and the Nevada Lead & Zinc in the Spruce mountain district of Elko county.

The zinc recovered from ore mined in Nevada increased from 16,920,083 pounds to about 30,000,000 pounds, in value from \$1,116,725 to about \$1,410,000. This large output

constituted 90 per cent of the total zinc production in the United States. The value of zinc increased from \$1,116,725 in 1929 to about \$1,410,000 in 1930.

OHIO STUDENTS STUDY LIGHTING EFFECTS ON WORK

COLUMBUS, O., Jan. 19 (AP)—Students in the department of industrial engineering, Ohio State university, will study the effects of various kinds of lighting on the speed of men at work. The study is a part of a research project undertaken by the Ohio Engineering Experiment Station.

Instead of using workmen for their experiments, the students will do certain kinds of work under various lighting systems. Their speed under each kind of light will be recorded and charted.

The engineering experiment station has found that human production can be increased as much as 35 per cent with proper lighting. The purpose of the research will be to establish the kind of illumination suitable for different occupations.

The study is believed to be the first of its kind undertaken. Illuminants used in the research will be the mercury vapor lamp, incandescent electric lamps and daylight.
