### Justice Hughes Withdraws From Supreme Bench

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21 (AP)—Chief Justice Charles Evans Hughes today withdrew from the supreme court bench pending arguments of the government's appeal from the ruling of Federal Judge William Clark of Newark that the eighteenth amendment was improperly written into the constitution.

Hughes gave as his reason that fact that he was an attorney in the so-called national prohibition cases from Rhode Island argued in 1920, when the courts upheld the amendment and the Volstead Act.

The small courtroom was filled to capacity as the nine elderly black-robed justices ascended the bench for today's hearing of the Clark case.

Hughes' withdrawal leaves the field open for wider speculation involving the court's lineup on the decision. An evenly divided 4-4 decision becomes a possibility, and this, some legal authorities believe, would allow Judge Clark's ruling to stand.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21 (AP)—Allan Hoover, younger son of the President, knows how to play as well as work.

He "hits the books" at the Harvard school of business administration, but when he's in the capital he hosts parties for the honor of having him at their parties.

And he accepts invitations right and left. This winter, during his holiday vacation at the White House, he was a center of gaiety in the younger social set.

Apparently heart-whole and fancy-free, he stands in the "stag" line at dances and "cuts in" with the rest of the young men. Sometimes he asks to be presented to some particular girl. And sometimes he sits out a dance.

During the Christmas holidays there was scarcely a night that the President's younger son did not roll away in a White House limousine to some brilliant ball. Sometimes he attended several parties in one evening—as is the way of Washington at the social season's height.

A year ago capital debutantes caught their breaths in delight at a sudden summons from the White House to a dancing party for Allan. It proved a lively event.

Again in the Christmas season, when Mrs. Hoover issued invitations for another dance for Allan, recipients were invited. A jazz orchestra played for both his White House dance—instead of the Marine band which usually plays for affairs in the historic East room.

While Allan distributes his attention impartially, there are a few girls whose names stand out in connection with his social activity.

One is Janet Large, his cousin, who was a guest at the White House during the holiday season. She accompanied Allan to many of the parties. Another is Marion Jardine, daughter of the former secretary of agriculture. She helped Allan receive his guests at the Christmas party a year ago.

Caroline Hyde, daughter of the present secretary of agriculture, is one of this year's group of social favorites whose holiday party Allan attended.

Last summer, unmindful of heat and discomfort, he donned overalls to work in a factory as part of his school training—and at Cambridge he is Allan the studious. In Washington, however, he is Allan the gay and happy.

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### Will Investigate Affairs of Realty Corporation

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 21 (AP)—Financial affairs of all trusts directed by the Harold G. Ferguson Corporation will be "investigated to the very bottom" to determine responsibility for alleged mismanagement, District Attorney Byron Pitts announced today.

The prosecutor said the inquiry might take months to complete and that special accountants and additional investigators would be engaged as the inquiry progressed.

The probe was initiated when State Corporation Commissioner Raymond L. Haught ordered suspension of sales permits granted to the Ferguson corporation and all trusts of the organization. Haught turned over to Pitts all the information regarding the evidence which prompted this action.

Carroll L. Beger of Hollywood, an expert analyst, met today with four deputy district attorneys assigned to the case and was said to have turned over to them all the information obtained by him in an independent investigation of the Harold G. Ferguson Trust No. 899. This trust was said to be the first target of the inquiry into asserted mismanagement.
