The Red Cross has been the "Great Mother" to the unfortunate in times of disaster and her kindly ministrations have saved thousands of lives and alleviated inestimable suffering.

And it has done this through the voluntary aid of the people of America without regard to politics, color or creed. It has created in the heart of America the impulse of mercy and generosity, giving to each one who happily contributed his mite a feeling of having a real helping hand in the work. It brought us near to those in misfortune and bound closer the ties of human brotherhood.

THE GAME LAW

WE HAVE BEEN informed that a group of wealthy California men have contemplated the purchase of large areas in Nevada for use as a gun club, but were deterred by the provision of the game law which prohibits the export of any game out of the state.

It is obvious that if a sportsman cannot take his bag home with him most of the enjoyment of the sport of hunting wild game is taken away. It is wise to prohibit the export of game for market purposes. But why not invite the investment of capital in gun clubs in some of our marshy lake areas? The building of Boulder Dam will doubtless create great areas of land covered with shallow waters which will be ideal places for wild ducks and geese.

Why not invite those seeking sites for game preserves to come to Nevada.

INVESTIGATIONS

To bring proceedings against a person under such circumstances seems almost equivalent to condemnation whether guilty or not guilty of wrong doing. And the attorney's fate, his right to practise law and make a living, his privilege of preserving his good name and living in honor among his fellows, is placed in the hands of his competitors in business to deal with in secret.

If we are correct in our understanding of the proceedings in question, based of course mostly on rumors, it is dangerous to be an attorney.

GUIDING YOUR CHILD

There is one means by which the adult may take all the satisfaction out of the naughtiness which springs from the desire to attract children.

The child has no way to combat an attitude of indifference on the part of his elders.

Of what use is it to scream and kick when being taken to bed if mother acts as though nothing unusual were happening and goes right on undressing you without even bothering to scold?

Where is the fun in making faces before the company at the dinner table or in turning somersaults at a tea party if nobody seems to notice whether you do it or not?

The absence of an audience robs any performance of its savour. Children are quick, of course, to notice the difference between real and pretended indifference. It is useless to pretend you don't mind when you do.

Suppose your child has decided to get a little notice by turning on the radio full blast when you are trying to talk with a friend. You have to shout to make yourself heard. The child knows your pretended indifference will soon break down before very real annoyance.

Don't act indifference that you can't genuinely carry through. On the other hand, don't let petty annoyances betray you into giving the child exactly what he wants—attention at any price.

When a child is making such a nuisance of himself that something must be done about it, deal with him with a minimum of words and emotional display. Prompt and quiet exile from the scene of misbehavior is usually an effective and convenient cure.
